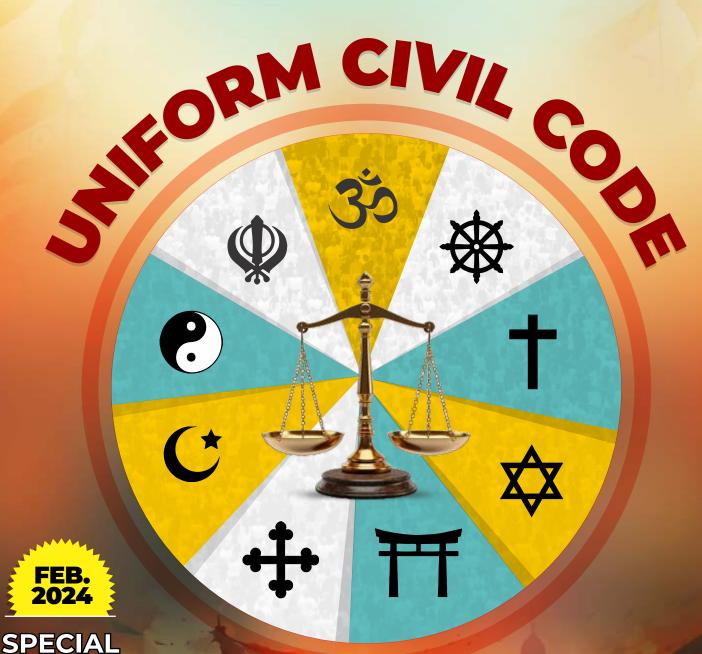

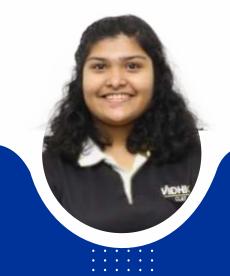
Know the success secrets, habits and the prep strategy she adopted that fetched her this success in CLAT 2023.

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** Hi Keerthna, Many Congratulations on achieving this feat. Tell us something about yourself.

**Keerthna:** Hi, I am Keerthna Nair, I did my schooling from St. Raphael's School, Indore with humanities stream. I started my preparation for CLAT in 11th standard with Vidhigya Classroom Programme.

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** There are different fields after 12th, what motivated you to make a career in law?

**Keerthna:** I think law seemed to me, a field that would allow me to make a difference, Afterall,

As regards my future aspirations, I want to give myself a few more years to explore the different carrier options within Law and choose the one that resonates the most with me. I think the internship opportunities in my near future will help me carve out my particular interests,

Vidhigya Correspondent: During your CLAT preparation, did you ever think that you would end up being at NLSIU Bengaluru

Keerthna: During the prep, just like every other CLAT aspirant, I wanted to come to NLS and I also had wallpapers of NLSIU with the phrase I am coming written there. So, I did manifest NLSIU and see myself there but I must add, It was also in part due to the unwavering trust Bahul sir had in me and my ability to do it that made me want to reach for the best out there.

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** Tell us about your CLAT preparation?

Keerthna: This was my first attempt at CLAT and I prepared for 2 years (XI and XII). Though I started preparing seriously only in 12th. When concepts were being covered, I was very particular about attending the classes and making my base understanding strong. I rarely missed mocks. I believe solving the mocks and Vidhigya T20 series questions was something that made me gain confidence in my preparation. Personal mentoring session by Bahul Sir helped me structure my preparation well.

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** How did you prepare for the FIVE sections of the paper? Can you elaborate on your preparation strategy for each section?

Keerthna: GK: I followed the Vidhigya Panchamrit, I read newspaper editorial compilations that helped me with not only the GK section but English and C.R as well. I would try my best to do the daily GK quiz. The weekly roundups by Samip Sir, and Analysis of GK Vidhigya

Mocks. I also completed the 2 compendiums of Static and C.A.

English: In the beginning I used to solve the module, without focusing on a single topic, I would choose 6 questions from 6 different topics and solve them in a row without timer, Focusing on strengthening my understanding of the passage, I also did all the Eng class worksheets in the class. Analysis of Eng section in the mock also gave me many insights that helped me increase my score substantially.

Maths: I started with the concepts of the most important topics and would do Data interpretation questions from the topics I covered .. I did the Q.T worksheets in the class and while analysing the Q.T section, I would try to solve the question by myself and take help from analysis videos only if I couldn't do it myself.

Logical Reasoning: I did C.R class worksheets and also sectional tests for C.R that allowed me to deal with a variety of questions. Sometimes when the C.R section were very tough in the

mocks I would also go back and do a basic google search on the topic mentioned .. Its history etc.. I did this to make myself familiar with the context in which a particular passage was written. This can also help with some passages in English (in case of Extracts from Novels read a summary of the book to give yourself a context)

**Legal Reasoning:** Bahul Sir's class notes allowed me clear my concepts well, For practice questions I referred to T20 series, VMTCs and their analysis videos and the class worksheets by BahulSir

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** What did you do to overcome your challenges?

Keerthna: During the preparation, there is a phase your marks become constant and overcoming that stagnant phase was a challenge for me. But if we keeping going forward without loosing faith in our ability I think we will be able to tackle it. I always had my family's support. My mentors at Vidhigya and some teachers at school helped me a lot. It is always easy to get through challenges when you have people

around you who believe in you and hold your hands throughout the journey

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** What was your study routine and best practices for CLAT?

**Keerthna:** I did not follow a strict study routine or time table as such but before sitting down to study I would tell myself some goals I had set for that day.

I would prioritise according to the class timetable. For eg. if next day we had C.R then I would do C.R on priority. G.K, I would cover daily and one more subject at night.

On Sundays, After the mock I would take a nap for 2 hrs after which I would sit down to do the mock analysis. I took up to 3 hours to do my mock analysis properly.

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** Did you take mock tests; how many did you take? Are they useful?

**Keerthna:** Mock tests were very important in adding structure to my CLAT preparation, Analysing the mocks

gave me insights into the mistakes that I could avoid and giving mocks in a time limit allowed me divide my time up for each section and to understand the risk reward ratio that worked out for me. I took around 80 mocks &in 12th I started analysing them properly which has certainly helped me. To all the aspirants, an advice I used to follow and I would like to give to them is to avoid post — mock discussions as far as possible as it weigh heavy on you .. Always remember that your competition is with your yesterday's self not with anybody else.

Vidhigya Correspondent: There are certain times when you don't score good in your Mock Tests and you feel low about it. How did you stay motivated during your CLAT preparation?

Keerthna: Like every other CLAT aspirant during my prep I had my lows as well, But the most important thing is to tell yourself to not give up, no matter how hard it gets and keep talking to people who are supporting you through this journey, your parents, grand parents, mentors. I used to tell myself

that every night when I go to bed I must feel that today I did my best possible work. I used to try not to get myself affected by low scores and start preparing for the next week, But if at all I felt like giving up I would stop studying and go out on a drive with my mother É or I would talk to myself until I felt motivated again. When your motivation is low, stop, recharge and start again.

Vidhigya Correspondent: How is life at NLSIU Bengaluru? What are the things you are cherishing the most?

Keerthna: As they say, 'Harvard is Hard', 'Harvard of East' is no less hard. It takes consistency and hard-work to keep your head above the water here, but I think, the idea of being consistent is a lesson they wish to impart in you through your CLAT prep itself .Even though academics is rigorous, simultaneously you get to

make friends from different states, live a 'hostel life' which is a lot of fun and meet dignitaries like CJI and Mrs. Sudha Murthy on campus. I think NLS gives you a wholesome exposure and sets the bar high in terms of academic and non-academic standards.

**Vidhigya Correspondent:** Your message for the other CLAT Aspirants preparing for upcoming CLAT exams?

**Keerthna:** I would say first 'Know your Why'. When you know your 'why' start working hard and give your best every day. Pull yourself up every time you fall, NEVER GIVE UP because believe me in the end its all worth the effort.

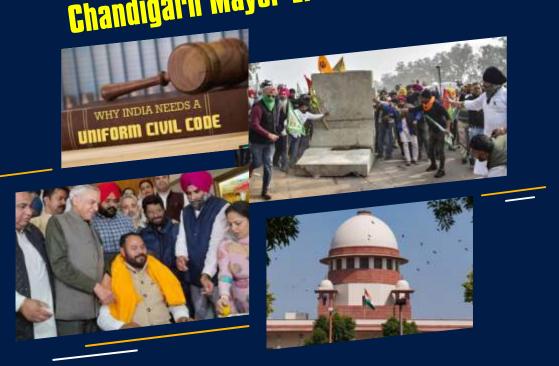

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# **BIG NEWS**

# Uniform Civil Code (UCC) in Uttarakhand

The bill seeks to govern and regulate the laws related to marriage and divorce, succession, live-in relationships etc. in the state.

- It has been prepared by a five-member committee led by former Supreme Court Judge Ranjana Prakash Desai.
- The Seventh Schedule of the Constitution provides that both the Centre and state legislatures can legislate on matters pertaining to family laws. In pursuance of this power, the government of Uttarakhand passed Uniform Civil Code in the state Assembly.



#### **Applicability**

- ✓ It will be applicable to the residents of Uttarakhand (but only to those who identify within the binary genders of male and female who are in heterosexual relationships, thus leaving most LGBT persons outside its ambit).
- ✓ It excludes members of the Scheduled Tribes (ST) and their unique customary practices.
- ✓ UCC does not disturb those customary practices pertaining to family law that are protected under Part XXI the Constitution.

#### **Key Features of the Bill**

#### 1. Regulates 'Live-in' Relationships:

- ✓ **Mandatory Registration Requirement:** All the heterosexual couples (irrespective of their domicile) in a live-in relationship will have to mandatorily register their relation by submitting a "statement of live-in relationship" to the concerned registrar within one month of entering such relationship.
- ✓ **Penalties for Non-Registration:** Failure to register will attract imprisonment for up to three months or a fine up to Rs. 10 thousand or both. If no registration is made upon being issued a notice, there is a provision for six months of imprisonment or a fine of Rs. 25,000 or both.
- ✓ **Consequences of False Statements:** Any false statement will also attract imprisonment for up to three months or a fine of Rs. 25 thousand or both.
- ✓ **Notification to Parents/Guardians for Minors:** Declarations will also be sent to the parents/guardians if either of the partners is less than 21 years of age.



#### **CLAT CAM FEB. 2024**

- ✓ **Registrar's Summary Inquiry:** The registrar upon receiving the information, may conduct a "summary inquiry" to ensure that the relation does not fall under prohibited categories i.e., if a partner is married or in another relationship, if either of the partner is minor and his/her consent was obtained forcefully, by fraud or misrepresentation.
- ✓ **Timely Decision by Registrar:** The registrar must take a decision within 30 days and reasons must be conveyed in writing in case of refusal of permission.
- ✓ **Termination of Relationship:** The relationship can be terminated by either of the parties by submitting a "statement of termination".
- ✓ Maintenance Claim for Desertion: A woman can claim maintenance from her live-in partner in case of desertation.
- **2. Illegitimate Children:** The bill abolishes this concept and extends legal recognition to children born in void and voidable marriages, as well as the ones born in live-in relationships.
- **3. Bigamy/Polygamy** is prohibited under the bill as per section 4 which states that neither party should have a spouse living at the time of the marriage. Thus, prohibition on bigamy/polygamy has been extended to all communities/Religions.

#### 4. Marriages:

- ✓ Compulsory Marriage Registration: Registration of marriage has been made compulsory while the marriageable age is left the same i.e., 21 and 18 for men and women respectively.
- ✓ Flexibility in Marriage Ceremonies: Marriages may be solemnized through any ceremonies or rituals as per legislations such as The Anand Marriage Act, 1909, Arya Marriage Validation Act, 1937, and The Special Marriage Act, 1954, among others.
- ✓ Public Inspection of Marriage Register: Upon registration, the Register of Marriages is open to public inspection.
- ✓ Validity of Unregistered Marriages: An unregistered marriage remains valid but failure to register a marriage after issue of notice by the sub-registrar will attract a fine of Rs 25,000.
- ✓ Exception for Customary Marriages: It retains the "custom" exception for married parties within the "degrees of prohibited relationships" from the Hindu Marriage Act.
  - Degrees of prohibited relationship applies to two people who share a common ancestry or are the wife/husband of a common ancestor. It applies to those communities, which have an established custom allowing marriage within the degrees of prohibited relationships.

#### 5. Divorce: (Men and women have been accorded similar rights with respect to divorce.)

- ✓ Restrictions on Divorce Initiation: It prohibits the initiation of divorce proceedings (Section 28) before one year of marriage but if the petitioner has suffered "exceptional hardship" or if the respondent has exhibited "exceptional depravity", then divorce can be filed.
- ✓ Mandatory Court Order for Divorce: No marriage can be dissolved without a court order or else it can attract imprisonment of up to 3 years.
- ✓ Grounds for Divorce and Exclusions: Divorce can also be obtained on the grounds of religious conversion, but it excludes the case of "irretrievable breakdown of marriage".
- ✓ Women's Right to Divorce: Women can specifically seek a divorce if the husband has been found guilty of rape or any kind of unnatural sexual offence or if he has more than one wife.
- ✓ Child Custody Following Divorce: The custody of a child up to 5 years remains with the mother after the divorce.



#### 6. Inheritance Rights: (The Bill extends equal property rights for sons and daughters across all classes.)

- ✓ It abolishes the coparcenary system governing ancestral property under the Hindu Succession Act, 1956 and all properties will pass as individual property as per the scheme of intestate succession which
- ✓ guarantees equal property rights for the spouse, children, and parents.
- ✓ In case there is no immediate family, the property will be equally divided among second-line relatives (first cousins from the paternal side). Others can also stake a claim if no eligible claimants are found.
  - As per the Hindu Succession Act, 1956, property can be held as coparcenary property or selfacquired property. Four generations of Hindus hold ancestral property as coparceners. The share of the deceased in the coparcenary property forms part of the property pool again. Consequently, for a person to get their individual share in coparcenary property, the property has to be partitioned.
  - Self-acquired property on the other hand, is individual property, and is passed on as per rules for intestate succession on death.
- **7. Guardianship:** It remains silent on the question of guardianship. Thus, the Guardians and Wards Act (GWA), 1890 will continue to govern court-appointed guardians while natural guardianship will be governed by personal laws.
- ✓ All personal laws on guardianship follow the archaic common law principle wherein the father is deemed the guardian of the child and has the right to take decisions in relation to the child and the child's property whereas the mother is relegated to the role of caretaker.
- ✓ The Supreme Court (SC) in the past has attempted to end this discrimination by stating that the mother can be appointed the guardian of the child if the father fails at discharging his functions as a guardian.
- **8. Adoption:** It fails to provide for mandatory registration of adoption unlike marriages and live-in relationships. The Hindu Adoption and Maintenance Act (HAMA), 1956 and the Juvenile Justice (JJ) Act, 2015 will continue to prevail.
- ✓ Hindus, Buddhists, Jains, and Sikhs can adopt under HAMA. It involves the giving and taking of the child between the surrendering parent or guardian and the adoptive parents.
- ✓ Adoption can also be done under the secular JJ Act, 2015 by anyone irrespective of their religion. It provides sufficient safeguards to protect the safety and best interests of the child being adopted.

#### **Concerns Raised**

#### 1. Exclusion of LGBT Community:

• The bill misses an opportunity to uphold the Supreme Court's decision on marriage equality, neglecting the rights of the LGBT community.

#### 2. Ignored Grounds for Divorce:

• Despite recognition in several Supreme Court judgments, the bill ignores the concept of irretrievable breakdown of marriage as a ground for divorce.

#### 3. Reliance on Criminalization:

 Enforcement of the bill through criminalization could disproportionately impact minority communities, potentially outlawing religious and customary practices and harming religious sentiments.



#### 4. Surveillance Regime:

• The registration process and open access to registration books may facilitate a surveillance regime, raising concerns of harassment, particularly for inter-faith and inter-caste couples.

#### 5. Breach of Right to Privacy (Article 21):

 Mandating the registration of live-in relationships infringes upon the right to privacy, as recognized under Article 21 of the Constitution. Compulsory registration also undermines individuals' freedom to choose not to marry.

#### 6. Opposition to Uniformity (Article 44):

 The bill's introduction of a state-specific UCC opposes the framers' intent of having a common UCC for the entire country, as outlined in Article 44 of the Constitution.

#### 7. Exclusion of STs and Hindu Undivided Families (HUFs):

• The bill's exclusion of Scheduled Tribes (STs) and Hindu Undivided Families (HUFs) overlooks significant segments of the population, potentially denying them the benefits and protections offered by the UCC.

#### **Uniform Civil Code (UCC)**

The Uniform Civil Code seeks to replace the existing diverse personal laws, which vary based on religious affiliations, with a common law governing personal matters such as marriage, divorce, adoption, inheritance, and succession for all citizens, irrespective of their religion.

#### **Objectives:**

- ✓ Establish consistency in laws across diverse communities.
- ✓ Promote equality between the rights of men and women, both within and across communities.

#### **Related Constitutional Provisions:**

Article 44 of the Indian Constitution, under the Directive Principles of State Policy (DPSP-Part 4), directs the state to secure a uniform civil code for citizens throughout the country.

#### **Origin:**

- ✓ The British Government in 1835 submitted its report recommending a uniform code for Indian laws relating to crimes, evidence, contracts, etc., but excluded personal laws of Hindus and Muslims from its perspective.
- ✓ The B N Rau committee, formed in 1941, recommended a codified Hindu Law giving equal rights to women, adopted in 1956 as the Hindu Succession Act.
- ✓ Despite these efforts, separate personal laws persisted for Muslims, Christians, and Parsis.
- ✓ Dr. B R Ambedkar, while formulating the Constitution, made the UCC voluntary and recommended its implementation when the nation was ready to accept it.
- ✓ **UCC in DPSP:** The fundamental rights sub-committee, led by Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, decided against categorizing UCC under fundamental rights with a 5:4 majority vote.



### NDPS Act 1985

The Supreme Court recently overturned an order by the Madras High Court granting anticipatory bail to a respondent accused under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985 (NDPS Act). Anticipatory bail is granted under Section 438 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) for non-bailable offenses, allowing a person to seek bail if they fear arrest on false charges, due to enmity, or if a false case is likely to be built against them.

# About the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985 (NDPS Act)

The NDPS Act was introduced to control and regulate drug abuse by prohibiting activities related to the production, cultivation, sale, purchase, transport, storage, and consumption of any narcotic drug or psychotropic substance. It also provides for the identification, treatment, rehabilitation, and social reintegration of addicts.

- ✓ Narcotic Drugs: This includes substances like coca leaf, cannabis or hemp (charas, ganja), opium, poppy straw, and all manufactured drugs.
- ✓ **Psychotropic Substances:** These are substances that modify the mind, including substances specified in the Schedule of the Act such as amphetamine, methaqualone, diazepam, alprazolam, and ketamine.

#### Objectives of the NDPS Act

- ✓ Prevent, combat, and regulate operations relating to narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances.
- ✓ Provide for the forfeiture of property derived from or used in illicit trafficking.
- ✓ Implement international conventions on narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances to which India is a party.
- ✓ India is a signatory to several international conventions aimed at limiting the use of narcotics and psychotropic substances for medicinal, personal, and scientific purposes, as well as preventing their abuse. These include
  - 1. UN Single Convention on Narcotics Drugs, 1961,
  - 2. UN Convention on Psychotropic Substances, 1971, and
  - 3. UN Convention on Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances, 1988

**Need:** Prior to 1985, the statutory control over drugs was being exercised through the Opium Act of 1852, Opium Act of 1878 and The Dangerous Act of 1930. All of these regulations became outdated and inadequate with increasing drug abuse across the world. Thus, NDPS was introduced.

**Applicability:** It covers the whole territory of India as well as all Indian citizens living outside India and all persons travelling aboard ships and aircraft registered in India.

#### **Key Amendments to the NDPS Act**

#### 1988 Amendment:

✓ Introduced stricter provisions targeting the financing of illicit drug trafficking.





- ✓ Expanded the scope of offenses to include production, possession, sale, purchase, transportation, and warehousing of narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances.
- ✓ This amendment aimed to strengthen enforcement measures and deter individuals or entities involved in financing drug trafficking activities.

#### 2001 Amendment:

- ✓ Focused on improving access to justice for drug addicts by streamlining the bail process.
- ✓ Eased the requirements for obtaining bail, particularly for individuals accused of drug-related offenses.
- ✓ This amendment aimed to ensure that individuals with substance abuse issues could navigate the legal system more effectively and access bail when necessary.

#### 2014 Amendment:

- ✓ Achieved uniform regulation of narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances across the country, eliminating conflicts between state-level regulations.
- ✓ Facilitated access to essential narcotics such as morphine and fentanyl for medicinal purposes, particularly in pharmaceutical preparations.
- ✓ Revised penalties for drug trafficking offenses, reducing the death penalty for repeat criminal convictions to a discrete 30-year sentence.
- ✓ Increased the maximum penalty for "small quantity" offenses from 6 months to 1 year of imprisonment.
- ✓ This amendment aimed to balance the need for stringent measures against drug trafficking with ensuring access to essential medications for medical purposes.
- ✓ 2014 amendment addressed the difficulty in procuring morphine, a critical pain management medication, by amending the NDPS Act to make it more accessible.

#### Punishments under the NDPS Act

#### For Possession/Sale/Manufacture:

- ✓ The severity of punishment depends on the quantity of narcotic drugs or psychotropic substances involved and the gravity of the offense.
- ✓ Small Quantity: If a person is found in possession, engaged in sale, or involved in manufacturing of a small quantity (less than 1 kg) of drugs such as cannabis, the punishment may include imprisonment for up to one year along with a fine of up to Rs 10,000.
- ✓ Commercial Quantity: For offenses involving a commercial quantity (20 kg or more) of drugs, the fine can extend up to Rs. 2 lakhs or more at the discretion of the court, and the imprisonment term can be up to 20 years.

#### For Consumption:

✓ Individuals found consuming narcotic drugs or psychotropic substances may face a sentence of up to six months in prison, along with a fine of up to Rs 10,000.

#### For Repeated Offenders:

- ✓ Repeat offenders may face enhanced penalties, including a jail term of up to one and one-half times the maximum term of imprisonment for the offense.
- ✓ Additionally, repeat offenders may be subject to a fine of up to one and one-half times the maximum fine imposed for the offense.



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✓ Depending on the circumstances and the quantity of drugs seized, repeat offenders may also face the possibility of being sentenced to death.

#### **Important Note:**

✓ An amendment to the NDPS Act in 1989 made the sentence awarded under the Act non-commutable, meaning it cannot be substituted by a lesser sentence, except for the sentence awarded for the consumption of drugs. This amendment underscores the serious nature of drug-related offenses and aims to deter individuals from engaging in drug trafficking or consumption.

#### Other steps, initiatives, and institutions aimed at curbing the drug menace in India

#### 1. National Policy on Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances:

✓ Aligned with Article 47 of the Indian Constitution, this policy mandates the state to strive towards prohibiting the consumption of intoxicating drugs, except for medicinal purposes, due to their detrimental effects on health.

#### 2. Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment (MoSJE):

✓ Designated as the nodal Ministry for drug demand reduction in the country.

#### 3. Nasha Mukt Bharat Abhiyaan (NMBA):

- ✓ Launched by MoSJE on August 15, 2020, in 272 identified most vulnerable districts, and later extended to all districts across the country.
- ✓ Aims to spread awareness about substance use, with a focus on higher educational institutions, university campuses, and schools.

#### 4. National Action Plan for Drug Demand Reduction (NAPDDR) 2018-2025:

- ✓ Includes initiatives such as:
  - Toll-free Helpline Number 14446 for de-addiction and providing primary counseling and immediate referral services.
  - Development of Navchetna Modules and teacher-training modules for sensitizing students, teachers, and parents on drug dependence, coping strategies, and life skills.
  - Launch of a mobile app and web portal called 'Map Drugs' for identifying and destroying illegal drug farming.
  - Establishment of an e-portal named 'SIMS' (Seizure Information Management System) for cases involving large seizures.

#### 5. UNODC (United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime):

✓ Collaborates with the Indian Government and law enforcement agencies to develop a comprehensive strategic framework to address the drug problem.

#### 6. Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF):

- ✓ Directed by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) to be created by state governments under their respective Directors General of Police (DGPs) to fight the drug menace for a "drug-free India" by 2047.
- ✓ ANTF investigates criminal cases related to drugs as classified or assigned by the Supreme Court, High Court, government, or DGP.



# Supreme Court strikes down Electoral Bond Scheme

A five-judge Constitution Bench (Led by CJI DY Chandrachud) unanimously struck down the Electoral Bond

Scheme (EBS) terming it unconstitutional, manifestly arbitrary and a violation of the Right to Information (RTI) under Article 19(1)(a) of the Constitution and disproportionate restrictions.

#### Directions of Supreme Court

#### 1. Stop Issuing EBs and Furnish Details:

- The State Bank of India (SBI) was ordered to immediately halt the issuance of any further electoral bonds.
- SBI was directed to provide detailed information about each bond purchased since April 12, 2019, including the date of purchase, name of the purchaser, and denomination, to the Election Commission of India (ECI) by March 6.

#### 2. Publication of Information by ECI:

 The Election Commission of India (ECI) was instructed to publish all the information shared by the SBI

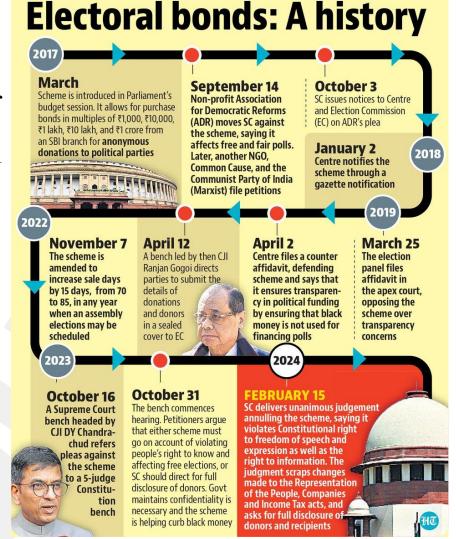
regarding electoral bonds on its official website by March 13, 2024.

#### 3. Return of Unencashed EBs:

- Electoral bonds that are within the validity period of fifteen days but have not yet been encashed by the political party were ordered to be returned to the issuing bank.
- This directive ensures that the amount can be refunded back to the purchaser's account.

# Far Reaching Implications of the Supreme Court's Landmark Judgement

1. Ensuring Equal Opportunities for All Political Parties:





- The verdict aims to level the playing field by eliminating discrimination based on the popularity or vote share of political parties.
- Smaller and regional parties are expected to benefit from this decision as they can now compete on an equal footing with larger parties, providing voters with a broader range of choices.

# 2. Strengthening Democratic Framework:

- **Protecting** the voters' right to information is essential in а democratic system. The judgment ensures transparency by providing crucial information about political funding to the public.
- Withholding essential information, especially under the guise of privacy, contradicts the principles of transparency and undermines the democratic process.

#### **Electoral Bond Scheme**

Electoral bonds (EBs) are financial instruments used for making donations to eligible political parties in India. Here are the key points about electoral bonds:

#### ✓ Nature and Usage:

- Electoral bonds are interest-free bearer bonds or money instruments.
- They can be used for making donations to eligible political parties.
- There is no limit on the number of electoral bonds that one can purchase.

#### ✓ Eligible Political Parties:

 Only political parties registered under Section 29A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951, and securing at least one percent of the votes polled in the last General Election to the House of the People or the Legislative Assembly are eligible to receive electoral bonds.

#### ✓ Face Value and Sale:

- Electoral bonds are sold in multiples of Rs 1,000, Rs 10,000, Rs 1 lakh, Rs 10 lakh, and Rs 1 crore.
- They are sold through designated branches of the **State Bank of India** (**SBI**).

#### ✓ Purchase and Validity:

- They can be purchased from designated SBI branches during the first 10 days of the beginning month of every quarter.
- Electoral bonds are valid for 15 calendar days from the date of issue.

#### ✓ Encashment:

• Proceeds from the bonds, if not encashed within 15 days of issuance, are deposited in the Prime Minister Relief Fund (PMRF).

#### ✓ Purchasers:

 Any person, including individuals, Hindu Undivided Families (HUFs), companies, firms, or associations, can purchase electoral bonds through a KYC-compliant account.

#### ✓ The EBS Timeline:

- **2017:** The scheme is introduced as a Finance Bill.
- **September 14, 2017:** The scheme is challenged by NGO 'Association for Democratic Reforms'.
- October 3, 2017: Notice issued by SC to Centre and EC on PIL filed.
- **January 2, 2018:** The scheme is notified by the Central government.
- **November 7, 2022:** The sale days of EBs increased from 70 to 85 in a year where any assembly election may be scheduled.
- October 16, 2023: Pleas against the scheme referred to a five-judge Constitution bench.
- **November 2, 2023:** The verdict on the scheme is reserved by SC.
- **February 15, 2024:** Unanimous judgment by SC bench annuls the scheme.

about the potential misuse of electoral bonds by eliminating the anonymity of donors.

• By removing the cloak of anonymity, the decision aims to reduce the influence of money and corporate interests in politics, encouraging political parties to prioritize the public interest over the interests of donors.

#### 4. Boosting Transparency and Accountability in Political Funding:

- Guaranteeing public access to information about the source and amount of funding received by political parties through electoral bonds enhances transparency.
- This provision empowers citizens to scrutinize political parties' actions and hold them accountable for their performance and decisions.



# Farmers protest and demand of MSP

- ✓ A major demand of the farmers protesting in Delhi is for the enactment of a law to guarantee MSP for all crops, as per the formula recommended by the Dr. M S Swaminathan Commission.
- ✓ This comes at a time when a committee appointed by the central government in July 2022 continues to deliberate on ways to make MSP more effective and transparent.

#### Minimum Support Price (MSP) Regime in India

#### **Background**

- ✓ The Food-Grain Enquiry Committee, established by the Nehru administration in 1957, was the first attempt to address the agricultural earning issue.
- ✓ Then, in 1964, Lal Bahadur Shastri formed the Food Grain Price Committee (under LK Jha), to push for a MSP regime.
- ✓ Despite the fact that the report was quickly accepted by the Shastri government, the first MSP announcement was made in 1967.
- ✓ Thus, the MSP regime came into existence as a policy decision and the government set up the Agricultural Prices Commission for fixing MSP for crops.
  - The commission was renamed as the CACP in 1985.

#### **About MSP**

- ✓ MSP is a form of market intervention (a policy decision not enforceable by law) by the Government to insure agricultural producers against any sharp fall in farm prices during bumper production years.
- ✓ These are announced by the Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs (Chaired by the Prime Minister of India).
- ✓ The recommendations of the Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP) at the beginning of the sowing season for certain crops forms the basis of these announcements.

## Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP) takes into account several factors when recommending Minimum Support Prices (MSPs) for various crops:

- **1. Commodity's Demand and Supply:** This factor helps assess the balance between the production and consumption of a particular crop, influencing its market dynamics and pricing.
- **2. Cost of Production:** The CACP evaluates the expenses incurred by farmers during the cultivation of crops, including inputs like seeds, fertilizers, labor, and machinery.
- **3. Market Price Trends:** Both domestic and international market trends are considered to gauge the prevailing prices of the crop and anticipate potential fluctuations.
- **4. Inter-crop Price Parity:** The CACP analyzes the relative prices of different crops to ensure equitable pricing and prevent distortions in farmers' cropping patterns.
- **5. Terms of Trade:** This refers to the ratio of farm input prices to farm output prices, which helps assess the profitability of agricultural production compared to other sectors.
- **6. Minimum Margin over Cost of Production:** The CACP recommends MSPs that provide farmers with a minimum profit margin over their cost of production, typically set at 50% or more.
- **7. Implications on Consumers:** The potential impact of MSPs on consumers, particularly in terms of food prices and inflation, is also taken into consideration to strike a balance between farmers' welfare and consumers' interests.



#### **Objectives of MSP**

- ✓ **Preventing Distress Sales:** MSPs serve as a guaranteed floor price for farmers' produce, protecting them from selling their crops at distressingly low prices during times of market glut or adverse conditions.
- ✓ **Procurement for Public Distribution:** When market prices fall below the MSP, government agencies step in to purchase the entire quantity of the crop at the announced minimum price. This procurement ensures an adequate supply of food grains for public distribution and maintains stability in the market.

#### **Crops covered**

- ✓ Government announces MSPs for 22 mandated crops and fair and remunerative price (FRP) for sugarcane (total 23).
- ✓ Crops covered by MSPs include:
  - 7 types of cereals (paddy, wheat, maize, bajra, jowar, ragi and barley),
  - 5 types of pulses (chana, arhar/tur, urad, moong and masur),
  - 7 oilseeds (rapeseed-mustard, groundnut, soyabean, sunflower, sesamum, safflower, nigerseed),
  - 4 commercial crops (cotton, sugarcane, copra, raw jute).

#### Sanjay Agrawal Committee

The committee constituted in 2022 by the Union Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare focuses on several key areas related to agriculture, natural farming, and crop diversification.

#### **Background:**

- ✓ The committee was formed following the conclusion of the year-long farmers' protest at Delhi's borders after the government announced the repeal of the controversial farm laws.
- ✓ Its primary areas of focus are Minimum Support Price (MSP), natural farming, and crop diversification.
- ✓ However, the terms of reference do not include a legal guarantee for MSP.

#### **About the Committee:**

✓ Headed by Sanjay Agrawal, a former agriculture secretary, the committee comprises 26 members.

#### Terms of Reference of the Committee

- 1. Promotion of Zero Budget Natural Farming (ZBNF): To advocate and promote sustainable farming practices under ZBNF, aiming to enhance soil fertility, reduce production costs, and increase farmers' income.
- **2. Suggestions on Natural Farming:** Providing recommendations on various aspects of natural farming, including value chain development, protocol validation, research needs, and expanding the area under Indian Natural Farming System.
- 3. Crop Pattern Changes: Recommending changes in crop patterns to align with evolving national needs.
- **4. Strengthening Agricultural Marketing System:** Proposing measures to enhance the agricultural marketing system to ensure better prices for farmers' produce, both domestically and through exports.
- **5. Crop Diversification:** Mapping existing cropping patterns, formulating strategies for crop diversification, ensuring remunerative prices for new crops, and reviewing micro-irrigation schemes.
- **6. Enhancing MSP Effectiveness and Transparency:** Making suggestions to improve the effectiveness and transparency of MSP, including granting more autonomy to the Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP) and implementing scientific measures in MSP determination.



#### Consequences of According Legal Stature to MSP

- 1. Sustainability Concerns: According to a policy paper by NITI Aayog's agricultural economist Ramesh Chand, sustaining a price level solely through legal means, without considering demand and supply dynamics, may not be feasible in the long run. This approach could lead to market distortions and inefficiencies.
- **2. Impact on Agricultural Growth:** The paper highlights that sectors such as horticulture, milk, and fisheries, which have minimal market intervention, have shown higher annual growth rates compared to cereals, where MSP and other interventions are prevalent. This suggests that excessive intervention in the form of MSP may hinder agricultural growth.
- **3. Inflationary Pressures:** Increasing procurement costs associated with MSP could lead to higher prices of food grains, subsequently contributing to inflation. Such inflationary pressures could disproportionately affect the poor, who spend a significant portion of their income on food.
- **4. Challenges in Private Sector Participation:** Implementing legally guaranteed MSPs may pose practical difficulties in engaging the private sector. Private buyers may be reluctant to comply with mandated prices, leading to potential market disruptions and shortages.
- **5. Case of Sugarcane:** The paper cites the example of sugarcane, where the Fair and Remunerative Price (FRP) acts as the statutory minimum price. The accumulation of arrears owed to sugarcane farmers by private sugar mills illustrates the challenges associated with enforcing MSP. The mismatch between FRP and sugar prices has resulted in significant financial burdens on sugar mills.

#### Suggestions

- ✓ **Direct Income Support:** Implement direct income support programs for farmers to provide financial assistance regardless of market fluctuations, enhancing economic stability.
- ✓ **Investment in Infrastructure:** Improve agricultural infrastructure by investing in irrigation, rural roads, storage facilities, and post-harvest management, along with easier access to credit and power.
- ✓ **Addressing Disguised Unemployment:** Create employment opportunities in non-agricultural sectors through policies promoting industrial growth, skill development, and entrepreneurship to reduce disguised unemployment in agriculture.
- ✓ **Diversification of Livelihoods:** Encourage non-farm activities like agro-processing, rural tourism, and small-scale industries to diversify rural livelihoods and reduce dependency on agriculture.
- ✓ **Supporting Sustainable Farming Practices:** Promote sustainable farming practices such as organic farming and conservation agriculture through incentives, training, and technical assistance to enhance resilience and mitigate climate change effects.



# Chandigarh Mayor election quashed

The Supreme Court (SC) recently invalidated the result of the Chandigarh Mayor Election due to controversy surrounding the deliberate invalidation of eight ballots cast in favor of the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP)-Congress candidate, resulting in the declaration of the BJP candidate as the winner.

#### Background

- ✓ The election for Chandigarh's Mayor post occurred on January 30, 2024, where the BJP secured 16 votes out of 36, while the joint AAP-Congress combine received 12 votes.
- ✓ The Returning Officer (RO) invalidated eight votes cast for the AAP candidate, leading to the BJP candidate's victory.
- ✓ Videos surfaced showing the RO marking ballot papers to invalidate them, prompting an AAP councilor to approach the High Court (HC), which listed the petition without an immediate stay on the results. The matter was then taken to the SC.
- ✓ During the hearing, the RO explained that he marked the votes to segregate them due to defacement by councilors.
- ✓ The SC deemed the remarks of the Presiding Officer inconsequential under regulation 6 of the Chandigarh Municipal Corporation (Procedure and Conduct of Business) Regulations 1996 and ruled the eight votes as valid.
- ✓ Regulation 6 stipulates that a ballot can only be invalidated –
  - if more than one vote is cast,
  - if there is any identifying mark of the voter, or
  - if the marks are placed ambiguously

#### **Final SC Verdict**

✓ The court, while using its power under Article 142 of the Constitution, held that allowing such a practice would be destructive of the most valued principles on which the entire edifice of democracy depends.

#### Role of the Returning Officer (RO)

#### **Definition**

• The individual responsible for overseeing elections within a constituency, or sometimes two, and announcing the elected candidate.

#### **Appointment**

 Appointed by the Election Commission of India (ECI) in consultation with the relevant State Government or Union Territory (UT).

#### **Duties and Responsibilities**

#### 1. Pre-election Preparation:

- ✓ Publish notices regarding the election and enforce the Model Code of Conduct.
- ✓ Accept and scrutinize nomination forms.
- ✓ Publish candidates' affidavits and allocate symbols to contesting candidates.

#### 2. Logistical Arrangements:

- ✓ Print and dispatch postal ballot papers.
- ✓ Prepare Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) and Voter-Verified Paper Audit Trail (VVPAT) systems.
- ✓ Conduct training sessions for polling personnel, sector officers, and area/zonal magistrates, covering all aspects including the use of EVMs with VVPATs.

#### 3. Ensuring Fairness:

- ✓ Ensure a free and fair election process.
- ✓ Designate and obtain approval for counting centers from the ECI.

#### 4. Communication:

- ✓ Notify candidates about the location, date, and time of vote counting.
- ✓ Communicate voting results promptly and accurately.

#### 5. Grievance Redressal:

✓ Address grievances promptly and efficiently to maintain the integrity of the electoral process.





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- ✓ It ruled in the favour of the AAP councilor and immediately quashed the result of the election declared by the presiding officer.
- ✓ It also expressed its disappointment over the actions of the RO as he had unlawfully altered the course of the Mayoral election and made a false statement before the court. The court therefore ordered a show-cause notice to be served to the RO under Section 340 (conduct affecting the administration of justice) of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

#### **Article 142 of the Constitution**

Article 142 grants the Supreme Court special powers to issue decrees or orders necessary for complete justice in any pending cause or matter before it when laws or statutes fall short.

#### **Enforceability:**

Orders issued under Article 142 are enforceable across India as per laws enacted by Parliament or orders of the President.

#### **Purpose of Inclusion:**

Access to Justice: It addresses potential barriers to accessing justice or realizing rights due to judicial compromise.

#### **Importance:**

- ✓ **Ensuring Justice:** Allows the SC to transcend legal constraints to dispense justice effectively.
- ✓ Exercising Executive and Legislative Functions: Empowers the SC to issue guidelines, directions, or orders to governments or authorities.
- ✓ **Intervention:** Permits intervention in matters of public interest, human rights, constitutional values, or fundamental rights protection.
- ✓ **Source of Judicial Activism:** Enhances the SC's role as a guardian of the constitution and final arbiter of law.

#### **Judicial Activism:**

Refers to the collective framework of Article 142, Article 32 (right to constitutional remedies), Article 141 (mandating adherence to SC decisions), and Article 136 (allowing Special Leave Petitions).

#### **SAFETY Technology**

SAFEETY stands for Smart Food Grain Storage System and has been developed by the Society for Applied Microwave Electronics Engineering and Research (SAMEER) under the guidance of MeitY.



#### **Features**

SAFEETY boasts cutting-edge features including conveyorized loading and unloading of grain bags with RFID for traceability, online weight and moisture measurement, and radio frequency-based removal of moisture from grain.

#### Capacity and Efficiency

This state-of-the-art system demonstrates remarkable efficiency, capable of handling nearly one truckload (approximately 28 tons) of grains in just 40 minutes.

#### Realizing Viksit Bharat at 2047

The transfer of SAFEETY technology signifies a significant step towards realizing the Innovation, Science, and Technology theme of Viksit Bharat at 2047, reflecting India's aspirations for advancement in various sectors.

#### Government-Private Collaboration for National Development

The collaboration between government entities and the private industry in the transfer of SAFEETY technology underscores the commitment to leverage technological innovations for the progress and development of the nation.

# Pradhan Mantri Matsya Kisan Samridhi Sah-Yojana (PM-MKSSY)

Pradhan Mantri Matsya Kisan Samridhi Sah-Yojana (PM-MKSSY) is a pivotal initiative aimed at formalizing the fisheries sector and supporting fisheries micro and small enterprises.

#### **Approval and Scope**

- ✓ The Union Cabinet has approved PM-MKSSY as a Central Sector Sub-scheme under the Pradhan Mantri Matsya Sampada.
- ✓ It spans four years from FY 2023-24 to FY 2026-27, covering all States and UTs with an investment of Rs 6,000 crores.

#### **Implementation Strategy**

#### ✓ Component 1-A: Formalization of Fisheries Sector

- Creation of a National Fisheries Digital Platform (NFDP) for registration of fish producers, workers, vendors, and processors.
- Financial incentives provided to encourage stakeholder registration.

# ✓ Component 1-B: Facilitate Adoption Of Aquaculture Insurance

• Introduction of appropriate insurance products covering aquaculture farms, with one-time incentives.





Additional incentives for SC, ST, and women beneficiaries.

#### **Business Payment Solution Provider (BPSP)**

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has instructed card networks Visa and Mastercard to discontinue their Business Payment Solution Provider (BPSP) business in commercial and business payments through corporate credit cards. Here are the key points regarding BPSP and the RBI's directives:

#### **Business Payment Solution Provider (BPSP)**

- ✓ BPSPs offer business-to-business payment services to corporates using credit cards.
- ✓ It was introduced around 2017 to enable small businesses to accept card payments without having a card terminal in their account.
- ✓ BPSP allowed corporates to make credit payments to their suppliers, even if the suppliers didn't have the infrastructure for accepting credit payments.
- ✓ Under this arrangement, the intermediary accepts card payments from corporates and transfers the funds via IMPS/RTGS/NEFT to non-card accepting recipients.

#### Regulatory Concerns Raised by RBI

- ✓ RBI classified this arrangement as a payment system under the provisions of the Payment and Settlement Systems (PSS) Act, 2007.
- ✓ Such payment systems require authorization under Section 4 of the PSS Act, which BPSP did not obtain, rendering the activity without legal sanction.
- ✓ RBI expressed concerns over non-compliance with Know Your Customer (KYC) norms in these transactions, highlighting potential risks associated with them.



#### Directive to Visa and Mastercard

- ✓ RBI has directed Visa and Mastercard to cease their BPSP business in commercial and business payments through corporate credit cards.

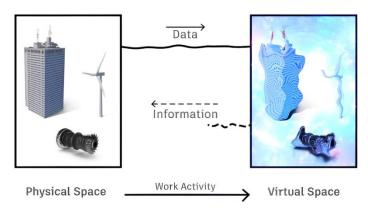

Nazool Land refers to land that was seized by the British government from local kings and rulers during the British era, particularly after defeating them in battles. After Independence, these lands were left vacant by the British, and due to poor documentation, the original owners failed to prove their ownership.





Consequently, these lands were marked as Nazool land and became the property of the respective state governments.

### Key points about Nazool Land

- 1. Ownership: Nazool Land is owned by the government but is not directly administered as state property. Instead, it is generally allotted to entities on lease for a fixed period, which can range from 15 to 99 years.
- **2. Usage:** Nazool Land is typically used for public purposes such as building schools, hospitals, Gram Panchayat buildings, etc. It may also be utilized for housing societies, usually on lease, at various locations.
- **3. Governing Rules:** The Nazool Lands (Transfer) Rules, 1956, is the primary law governing Nazool land adjudication. This legislation outlines the procedures and regulations regarding the transfer and management of Nazool land.
- **4. Lease Renewal:** The government has the authority to renew or cancel leases for Nazool land. If the lease term is expiring, individuals or entities can approach the Revenue Department of the local development authority in the concerned district to request lease renewal.

Regarding Waqf Land, it refers to lands permanently dedicated for religious, charitable, or pious purposes, according to Muslim law. Governed by the Waqf Act of 1995, these lands play a crucial role in supporting mosques, educational institutions, and welfare initiatives within the Muslim community. The Waqf Act establishes bodies such as the Central Waqf Council and State Waqf Boards, defines the powers and duties of trustees (mutawallis), and provides mechanisms for dispute resolution through Waqf Tribunals constituted by the state government.

### Section 41A of Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC)

Section 41A of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC) deals with the issuance of notices of appearance before a police officer.

### Key points regarding Section 41A and its implications

- **1. Notice of Appearance:** Under Section 41A, a police officer conducting a probe in a case can issue notices to individuals connected to that case, directing them to appear before him. This notice serves as a means for individuals to cooperate with the investigation.
- 2. Limitation on Arrest: If individuals comply with the notice issued under Section 41A and appear before the police officer, they cannot be arrested unless specific reasons exist. These reasons include preventing the person from tampering with evidence, committing further offenses, or facilitating a proper probe. Importantly, these reasons must be recorded in writing by the police officer.
- **3. Protection against Routine Arrests:** The provision aims to prevent routine arrests by the police when custody is avoidable. It ensures that individuals are given an opportunity to cooperate with the investigation before resorting to arrest.

In the case involving former ICICI Bank CEO Chanda Kochhar and her husband, the Bombay High Court deemed their arrest by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) as an "abuse of power" and a violation of Section 41A of the CrPC. The court noted that the arrest was carried out without proper application of mind and solely because the couple allegedly did not cooperate with the investigation. However, the court found that the Kochhars had complied with the notices served to them, which should have precluded their arrest under Section 41A.



### Injunction

Injunction is a legal remedy granted by a court to prevent a party from engaging in certain actions or behaviors. Here's an overview:

**Purpose:** Injunctions serve as preventive measures to stop legal wrongs or enforce rights. They are discretionary remedies granted by the court after considering various factors.

### **Types:**

- **1. Temporary Injunction:** Granted for a specified period or until further order of the court, aimed at securing the interests of an individual or property until a final judgment is made.
- **2. Perpetual Injunction:** Also known as permanent injunction, granted by a decree made at the hearing upon the merits of the suit, preventing the defendant from asserting rights or committing certain acts.
- **3. Mandatory Injunction:** Requires the defendant to carry out a particular action, compelling performance at the court's discretion.

**Legislation:** In India, injunctions are governed by the Specific Relief Act, 1963, which provides for different types of injunctions and procedures.

**Dynamic Injunction:** In some cases, courts grant injunctions even before a copyrighted work is publicly released, distributed, or created. This concept, known as dynamic injunction, is aimed at preventing irreparable loss due to online piracy.

**Enforcement:** If a party violates the terms of an injunction, they may be held in contempt of court, leading to penalties such as fines or imprisonment.

In a recent ruling, the Supreme Court emphasized that an injunction suit may not be maintainable if the plaintiff fails to prove title to the property while seeking injunction relief against the defendants. This underscores the importance of establishing legal standing and merit before seeking injunctive relief from the court.

### Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Amendment Bill, 2024

The Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Amendment Bill, 2024, which aims to amend the existing Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974, has received approval from the President. Here's an overview of the key points:

### Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974

- ✓ Enacted under Article 252 of the Constitution, this act is designed to prevent and control water pollution.
- ✓ It established the Central and State Pollution Control Boards (CPCB and SPCBs) to monitor and prevent contamination of public water resources by sewage and industrial effluents.
- ✓ The CPCB provides technical guidance and standards, while the SPCBs enforce compliance and file cases against violators.
- ✓ Industrial units must obtain permission from their respective state boards before setting up factories and comply with prescribed norms.

Violations of this act can result in shutdowns, fines, and imprisonment for up to six years.

anaemia.

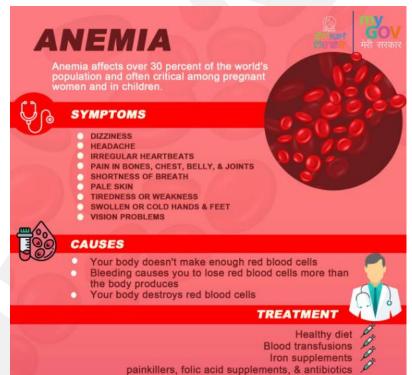
### **Key highlights of Mission Utkarsh**

- MoU Signing: The Ministry of Ayush and the Ministry of Women and Child Development signed а Memorandum Understanding (MoU) to collaborate on this initiative.
- 2. Objective: The primary objective of Mission Utkarsh is to control anaemia among adolescent girls by implementing Ayurvedic interventions for nutritional improvement.
- 3. Collaborative **Effort:** Mission Utkarsh involves the participation of 15 ministries or departments, indicating comprehensive and multi-faceted approach to address the issue.
- 4. Aspirational Districts: Initially, the mission will be launched as a pilot project in five aspirational districts, chosen from different states. Aspirational Districts are those identified by the Government of India as being among the most underdeveloped in terms of socio-economic indicators.
- 5. Pilot Districts: The five aspirational districts selected for the pilot phase of Mission Utkarsh are Dhubri in Assam, Bastar in Chhattisgarh, Paschimi Singhbhum in Jharkhand, Gadchiroli in Maharashtra, and Dhaulpur in Rajasthan.
- **6. Target Group:** The mission aims to improve the nutrition of approximately 95,000 adolescent girls in these anaemia-prone districts.

By focusing on Ayurvedic interventions and leveraging the collaborative efforts of multiple ministries, Mission Utkarsh seeks to make significant strides in addressing anaemia among adolescent girls, particularly in underdeveloped districts with high rates of malnutrition.

- ✓ Kerala's high doctor-patient ratio and literacy rate make it conducive for enforcing this rule effectively.
- ✓ An informed populace is more likely to understand and adhere to regulations, facilitating smoother execution and compliance.
- ✓ Kerala aims to demand hospitals to disclose the incidence of hospital-acquired infections and support the development of new antibiotics, diagnostics, and vaccines by entrepreneurs.

### **Impact and Future Outlook**

- ✓ While Kerala's implementation of the H1 rule is commendable, its immediate impact on drug-resistant infections may be limited.
- ✓ The effects of this initiative may take several years to manifest fully, but it will contribute to fostering a culture of respecting antibiotics and encourage further actions to combat AMR.

Operation AMRITH represents Kerala's proactive approach to addressing the challenge of AMR through stringent regulations and public awareness initiatives, setting an example for other states to follow in combating this global health threat.

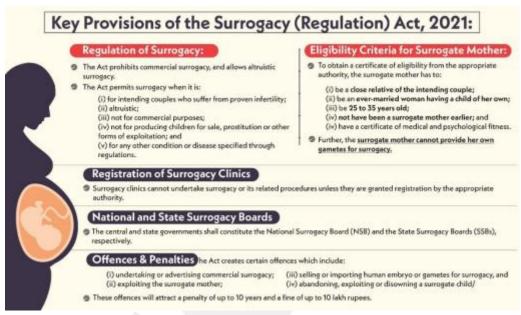


### Government Allows Donor Egg & Sperm in Surrogacy

The recent amendment to the Surrogacy (Regulation) Rules, 2022 by the Central government brings a ray of hope for couples desiring parenthood through surrogacy.

## **Key changes and implications**

1. Donor Gametes The Allowed: amendment permits the use of donor gametes, including ova (egg cells) and sperm, for married couples undergoing surrogacy. This particularly beneficial for couples facing medical complications hindering conception.



- **2. District Magistrate Board Certification:** In cases where either the husband or wife suffers from a medical condition preventing the use of their own gametes, the couple can resort to donor gametes. However, this necessitates certification by a District Magistrate Board.
- **3. Limitation on Donor Gametes:** The notification specifies that only one of the partners, either the wife or husband, can utilize a donor gamete. Additionally, at least one gamete from the intending parents must be used in the conception process.
- **4. Exclusion of Couples with Dual Medical Issues:** The amendment presents a challenge for couples where both partners have medical issues or are unable to provide their own gametes. Such couples are effectively precluded from opting for surrogacy under the current regulations.
- **5. Response to Supreme Court Concerns:** The modifications in the Surrogacy Rules follow doubts raised by the Supreme Court regarding the validity of existing regulations. The court was prompted by applications from married women unable to conceive due to medical complications.

In essence, while the amendment expands options for couples seeking surrogacy by allowing the use of donor gametes, it also introduces limitations and challenges, particularly for couples with dual medical issues. The changes reflect efforts to address concerns raised by the Supreme Court and provide clarity in the realm of surrogacy regulations.

### Divorced Muslim Women's Right to Maintenance

The Supreme Court's decision to examine the entitlement of a divorced Muslim woman to claim maintenance under Section 125 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) against her former husband marks a significant legal development.



## Key points regarding the ongoing debate surrounding maintenance rights for divorced Muslim women

### ✓ Muslim Women (Protection of Rights on Divorce) Act, 1986:

- This Act, introduced as a religion-specific legislation, outlines the procedure for Muslim women to claim maintenance during divorce.
- It was enacted to counter the Supreme Court's 1985 ruling in Mohd. Ahmad Khan v. Shah Bano Begum, which recognized a Muslim woman's right to seek maintenance under Section 125 of the CrPC. However, this decision sparked controversy over perceived conflicts with religious personal laws.

### ✓ Provisions of the 1986 Act:

- Section 3 of the Act guarantees maintenance payments to a divorced Muslim woman by her former husband during the iddat period, which typically lasts three months.
- The maintenance amount is typically equivalent to the mahr or dowry given to the woman at the time of marriage or afterward.
- After the iddat period, if the woman has not remarried and is financially unable to support herself, she can seek maintenance from a first-class magistrate.

### ✓ Section 125 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC):

- This provision establishes a secular law for the maintenance of wives, children, or parents.
- It allows individuals, including divorced Muslim women, to claim financial support from their spouses or children if they are unable to sustain themselves.

### ✓ Prior Judicial Precedents

### • Allahabad High Court's Rulings:

■ The Allahabad High Court has consistently upheld a divorced Muslim woman's entitlement to claim maintenance under Section 125 of the CrPC even after the conclusion of the iddat period, provided she remains unmarried.

### Mujeeb Rahiman v. Thasleena (2022):

- In this case, a single judge of the Kerala High Court opined that a divorced Muslim woman has the right to seek maintenance under Section 125 of the CrPC until she receives relief under Section 3 of the 1986 Act.
- The court's decision implied that the maintenance order remains valid until the amount stipulated under Section 3 of the 1986 Act is paid.

### • Noushad Flourish v. Akhila Noushad (2023):

- This case established a precedent where a Muslim wife who initiates divorce through khula, with her consent, is deemed ineligible to claim maintenance from her husband under Section 125 of the CrPC.
- The ruling highlights a distinction in the application of maintenance rights based on the method of divorce initiation within Muslim personal law.

### Newly Amended Electricity Rules and Rooftop Solar Power

The Ministry of Power has recently announced amendments to the Electricity (Rights of Consumers) Rules, 2020, aimed at facilitating the installation of rooftop solar projects and empowering consumers.



### Key highlights of the amendment

### 1. Simplification of Rooftop Solar Installation Process:

✓ Previously, DISCOMs had to conduct a feasibility study for rooftop solar projects within 20 days of

receiving an application. The amendment reduces this period to 15 days. If the study is not completed within this time frame, it is presumed that the proposal is technically feasible.

- ✓ Solar PV systems with a capacity of up to 10 kilowatts will be deemed accepted without requiring a study.
- ✓ DISCOMs can include the expenditure on strengthening distribution infrastructure for rooftop solar projects in their revenue requirement, with the maximum capacity to be prescribed by each state electricity regulatory commission.

## 2. Empowerment of Consumers in Residential Societies:

✓ Residents of residential societies now have the option to choose between individual connections for each

household or a single connection for the entire society. This choice will be determined through a fair voting process organized by the distribution company.

✓ If a single-point connection is chosen for the entire premises, the residential society association will handle metering, billing, and collection on a non-profit-no-loss basis. Otherwise, the DISCOM will manage these tasks for individual connections.

### 3. Expedited Process for New Electricity Connections:

✓ The period for obtaining a new electricity connection or modifying an existing one has been reduced to 3 days in metropolitan areas, 7 days in other municipal areas, and 15 days in rural areas. However, in rural areas with hilly terrain, the period remains at 30 days.

### 4. Inclusion of Electric Vehicles (EVs):

- ✓ The rules now mandate DISCOMs to provide a separate connection for electricity supply to EV charging points upon consumer request, within the revised timeframes mentioned above.
- ✓ This provision enables EV owners in metropolitan cities to obtain a new electricity connection for charging their vehicles within three days.

These amendments aim to streamline processes, promote renewable energy adoption, and enhance consumer rights and convenience in the electricity sector.





### **Annual Death Penalty Report 2023**

The Annual Death Penalty Report 2023, compiled by Project 39A, affiliated with the National Law University, Delhi, presents significant insights into the status of capital punishment in India.

### Key highlights and takeaways from the report



 Appellate courts in India, including the Supreme Court and all High Courts, confirmed only one death sentence in 2023. This marks a substantial decrease compared to previous years.

#### ✓ Low Confirmation Rate:

• The confirmation rate of death sentences by High Courts reached its lowest point in 2023 since 2000. Only one death sentence was confirmed by a High Court during the year.

### ✓ Supreme Court's Role:

• The Supreme Court did not confirm any death sentences in 2023, similar to the situation in 2021.

### ✓ Decline in Disposal Rate:

• There was a 15% decrease in the disposal rate of death penalty confirmation proceedings by High Courts in 2023 compared to the previous year.

### ✓ Rise in Death Row Population:

 The number of prisoners under death sentence increased by 45.71% by the end of December 2023 compared to 2016. 2023 witnessed the highest number of prisoners on death row in nearly two decades.

#### ✓ Nature of Offenses:

• The majority of death penalty cases in trial courts involved crimes related to sexual offenses, with more than 50% of sentences imposed for homicidal rapes.

### ✓ Concerns with Investigations and Trials:

 Acquittals and remands by the Supreme Court and High Courts in 2023 indicate significant concerns with the quality of police investigations and evidence appreciation by lower courts.

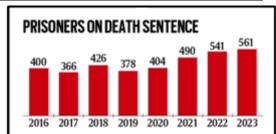

### EU Launches Non-Military Mission To Protect Cargo Ships in Red Sea

- ✓ EU has launched a naval mission to help protect cargo ships in the Red Sea as attacks by Houthi rebels continue to threaten maritime traffic, hamper trade.
- ✓ Dubbed 'Aspides' (Greek for shield), the mission will be run out of Larissa in central Greece home to the Hellenic Air Force and a NATO headquarters.
- ✓ The Iranian-backed Houthis have waged a persistent campaign of drone and missile attacks on commercial ships over Israel's offensive in Gaza against Hamas.
- ✓ In response, U.S. and British forces have bombed multiple targets used by the Houthis.
- ✓ However, the EU mission will not take part in any military strikes and will only operate at sea.

### PM Modi's Visit to UAE

PM Modi's ongoing official visit to the United Arab Emirates marks his seventh visit to the country since 2015 and the third within the past eight months. The visit has yielded several significant agreements and

pacts, emphasizing the growing bilateral relations between India and the UAE.

### Key pacts signed during the visit

- **1. Bilateral Investment Treaty:** A crucial agreement aimed at fostering investments in both countries.
- **2. Energy Cooperation:** Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed on cooperation in electrical interconnection and trade, enhancing collaboration in energy security and trade.

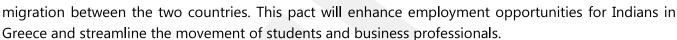

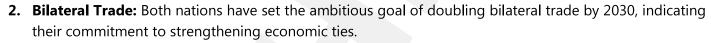

### Introduction of RuPay Cards in Mauritius

- ✓ The extension of RuPay card services in Mauritius enables local banks to issue RuPay cards, facilitating transactions based on the RuPay network.

- This waiver is limited to tourism and doesn't extend to other purposes like work or study.

- Currently, 27 countries offer visa-free entry to Indian citizens, reflecting a broader trend of expanding travel privileges for Indian passport holders.

China's recent movement of its nationals into the "Xiaokang" border defence villages along India's northeastern borders has raised concerns and underscores the ongoing territorial tensions between the two countries.

### China's Settlement Strategy along India's Borders

### 1. Xiaokang Villages Construction:

- China has been constructing 628
   "Xiaokang" or "well-off villages" along
   India's borders with the Tibet
   Autonomous Region since 2019.
- These villages are believed to serve dual purposes, serving both civilian and military functions.

### 2. Line of Actual Control (LAC) Disputes:

- The LAC serves as the demarcation line between Indian-controlled territory and Chinese-controlled territory.
- However, differing perceptions of its length and alignment between India and China have led to disputes and tensions.

### 3. Infrastructure Development Competition:

- Both China and India have been investing in infrastructure development along the LAC.
- China has been enhancing its connectivity through passes, constructing roads, bridges, and model villages.
- India has been improving its border infrastructure, including connectivity to forward areas and developing border villages under initiatives like the Vibrant Villages program.

### 4. Territorial Claims Divergence:

- India's claim line encompasses the entire boundary marked on official maps by the Survey of India, including Aksai Chin and Gilgit-Baltistan.
- However, China's claim line diverges, especially in the eastern sector where it asserts control over the entirety of Arunachal Pradesh as South Tibet.



### 5. Implications and Ongoing Tensions:

- The settlement of Chinese nationals in these villages adds to existing tensions along the LAC.
- It highlights China's strategic investments in border regions and underscores the need for continued vigilance and diplomatic efforts to address territorial disputes and prevent escalation.

### 7th Indian Ocean Conference

- ✓ Date and Location: The 7th edition of the Indian Ocean Conference took place in Perth, Australia on 9-10 February 2024.

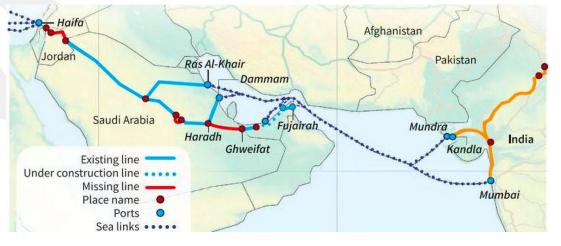

- ✓ **Dependency on Diplomatic Relations:** The success of the route depends on Israel maintaining friendly ties with Saudi Arabia and Jordan amidst the rapidly fluctuating situation in the Middle East.



# SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

### PM Modi Announces 4 Astronauts for Gaganyaan

- ✓ Prime Minister Modi reveals the names of the four astronauts selected for India's maiden crewed space mission, Gaganyaan: Prashanth Balakrishnan Nair, Angad Prathap, Ajit Krishnan, and Shubanshu Shukla.
- ✓ All are distinguished members of the Indian Air Force (IAF), holding ranks of either wing commanders or group captains, with extensive experience as test pilots.

### Overview of Gaganyaan Project

✓ Gaganyaan aims to demonstrate India's human spaceflight capability by launching a crew of three



members into a low-Earth orbit of 400 km for a duration of three days, followed by a safe return to Earth.

✓ Initiated in 2007 under the Indian Human Spaceflight Programme (IHSP), Gaganyaan is a crucial step towards developing the necessary technology for crewed orbital spacecraft missions.

### Launch Vehicle Mark-3 (LVM3)

- ✓ The Gaganyaan mission utilizes the Launch Vehicle Mark-3 (LVM3/GSLV Mk3), India's heaviest rocket, which comprises solid, liquid, and cryogenic stages.
- ✓ All systems of the LVM3 launch vehicle are reconfigured to meet human rating requirements, designated as Human Rated LVM3/HLVM3.

### **Current Status of Gaganyaan Missions**

- ✓ Gaganyaan missions include both manned and unmanned flights, with the first unmanned test flight, Gaganyaan-1, scheduled to take off by the end of 2024.
- ✓ The manned mission, carrying a three-membered crew to a low Earth orbit at an altitude of 400 km for three days, is scheduled subsequently.
- ✓ ISRO is actively developing technology for the proposed human-space flight mission, including life support systems, crew emergency escape provision, and crew management aspects.
- ✓ Successful tests of a basic crew module and crew escape system were conducted in October 2023.

### **Training of Astronauts**

- ✓ The four selected astronauts have completed generic training at Russia's Yuri Gagarin Cosmonaut Training Centre, facilitated by an MOU signed between ISRO-Glavkosmos in June 2019.
- Currently, they are undergoing specialized training at ISRO's astronaut training facility in Bengaluru. One
  astronaut is expected to receive training from NASA.



### Organoid Neural Network (ONN)

Scientists have achieved a significant breakthrough by combining brain-like tissue with electronics to create an 'organoid neural network' capable of recognizing voices and solving complex mathematical problems.

#### **Neural Networks Overview**

- ✓ Neural networks are a class of machine learning models inspired by the structure and functioning of the human brain. They consist of interconnected nodes (neurons) organized into layers, capable of learning from data, generalizing patterns, and making predictions or decisions.
- ✓ Deep learning involves training deep neural networks with multiple hidden layers to learn complex representations and features from data, finding applications in various fields such as image recognition, language processing, and robotics.

### What are Organoids?

Organoids are miniature 3D structures grown from stem cells under controlled laboratory conditions, resembling specific organs, including the brain. They mimic the structure and function of certain brain regions to some extent.

### About Organoid Neural Network (ONNs)

- ✓ ONNs integrate brain organoids with neural network technology by interfacing them with microelectrode arrays (MEAs). This setup enables the recording and stimulation of the organoid's electrical activity.
- ✓ The recorded electrical signals are used to construct a computational model of the organoid's neural network, facilitating further experimentation and artificial intelligence (AI) development.
- ✓ This innovation extends neuromorphic computing, the emulation of the human brain in computers, by directly incorporating brain tissue into computational systems.

### **Applications**

- **1. Understanding Brain Function:** ONNs provide a more realistic and dynamic model of brain activity compared to traditional cell cultures, aiding in the study of brain function.
- **2. Drug Discovery:** Testing drugs on ONNs could offer a predictive model for their effects on the human brain, potentially accelerating drug discovery and development.
- **3. Neuromorphic AI:** Developing AI systems based on the principles of the brain could lead to more efficient and flexible technologies with applications in various domains.

### Challenges

- **1. Complexity:** Organoids represent simplified models of the brain and may not fully capture its complexity.
- **2. Scalability:** Scaling up ONNs to mimic larger brain regions and functionalities remains a challenge, limiting their broader applicability.



# Observation of Interplanetary Dust Originating Zodiacal Light

The Physical Research Laboratory (PRL) in Ahmedabad has conducted observations on the origin of interplanetary dust responsible for the phenomenon known as zodiacal light, with a specific focus on Mars' moons, Deimos and Phobos.

### **Zodiacal Light**

- ✓ Zodiacal light refers to a faint, diffuse glow of sunlight scattered by interplanetary dust particles within the solar system.
- ✓ It is most prominently visible just after sunset or before sunrise, when the Sun is below the horizon and the sky is dark enough to observe this subtle illumination.
- ✓ The term "zodiacal light" derives from its position along the zodiac, the band of the sky through which the Sun, Moon, and planets traverse, though it is not tied to any specific zodiacal constellation.
- ✓ **Origin:** The phenomenon is attributed to sunlight being scattered by minuscule dust particles distributed within the plane of the solar system, believed to be remnants of comets and asteroids.
- ✓ **Visibility:** Optimal viewing conditions for zodiacal light occur on clear, moonless nights in areas with minimal light pollution. Though challenging to photograph due to its faintness, it can be discerned with the naked eye under suitable circumstances.
- ✓ **Study and Exploration:** Previous space missions, such as the European Space Agency's IRAS (Infrared Astronomical Satellite) and NASA's COBE (Cosmic Background Explorer), have contributed crucial data concerning the infrared emission associated with zodiacal dust.

### Lunar Nuclear Reactor Project (LNRP) by NASA

NASA has unveiled plans for its Lunar Nuclear Reactor Project (LNRP), marking the completion of the initial phase of this ambitious endeavor aimed at constructing a small electricity-generating nuclear reactor on the Moon.

### Implications of the Project

- 1. Sustainable Lunar Exploration: The deployment of a nuclear reactor on the Moon promises to revolutionize lunar exploration by providing a reliable and independent power source. This enables longer-duration missions, sustains permanent lunar bases, and facilitates the operation of scientific instruments for extended periods.
- 2. Resource Utilization: The LNRP could pave the way for in-situ resource utilization (ISRU) on the Moon, unlocking the potential to extract and utilize resources such as ice water for fuel or construction purposes. Placing a nuclear reactor in permanently shadowed areas, potentially containing water ice, or providing continuous power during lunar nights (lasting 14-and-a-half Earth days) are among the envisioned applications.
- **3. Gateway to Mars:** The technological advancements achieved through the development of the lunar reactor hold significant implications for future missions to Mars. The capability to generate crucial power can play a pivotal role in establishing a sustainable human presence on the red planet.
- **4. International Collaboration:** The LNRP has the potential to foster collaboration in space exploration on a global scale. Other countries may join the effort or benefit from the technological advancements and insights gained through this project, thereby promoting international cooperation in the exploration and utilization of space resources.



The Lunar Nuclear Reactor Project represents a crucial step forward in humanity's quest for sustainable exploration and utilization of celestial bodies, offering immense potential for scientific discovery and international collaboration in space exploration endeavors.

Notable examples include OpenFlamingo, MiniGPT-4, Otter, InstructBILP, and BLIVA.

### Advantages of LMMs in Healthcare

- **1. Analyzing Complex Medical Data:** LMMs excel at analyzing intricate medical data, including radiology images, genetic information, and patient histories, to identify patterns.
- **2. Personalized & Precision Medicine:** By leveraging patient medical histories and genetic makeup, LMMs facilitate personalized and precision medicine.
- **3. Accessibility and Affordability:** LMM-powered healthcare technologies aim to ensure equitable access for all individuals.

### Challenges Associated with LMMs

- **1. Ensuring Data Privacy and Security:** Safeguarding sensitive medical data is imperative when utilizing LMMs to prevent breaches and maintain patient confidentiality.
- **2. Bias and Fairness:** LMMs may perpetuate biases inherent in the data they are trained on, raising concerns about fairness and equity in healthcare delivery.

The WHO's guidance seeks to address these challenges while harnessing the potential benefits of LMMs in revolutionizing healthcare delivery.

### **INSAT-3DS Mission**

The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) successfully launched the INSAT-3DS satellite atop the GSLV-F14 launch vehicle. This mission, fully funded by the Ministry of Earth Sciences (MoES), aims to bolster the country's meteorological services and enhance environmental monitoring capabilities.

### **Objective**

✓ The primary objective of the INSAT-3DS mission is to augment India's meteorological services, particularly in weather, climate, and ocean-related monitoring. It seeks to complement the functions of the existing INSAT-3D and INSAT-3DR satellites, which have reached the end of their operational lives.





✓ Additionally, the mission aims to elevate capabilities in data collection and dissemination, enabling more effective monitoring of Earth's surface, atmosphere, oceans, and environment.

### **Features of the Mission**

- **1.** INSAT-3DS is equipped with four payloads, including an Imager, a sounder, a data relay transponder, and a satellite-aided search and rescue transponder.
- 2. Meteorological data from the satellite will be utilized by institutes under the Ministry of Earth Sciences, such as the India Meteorology Department (IMD), Indian Institute of Tropical Meteorology (IITM), National Institute of Ocean Technology (NIOT), and Indian National Centre for Ocean Information Services (INCOIS).
- **3.** The mission's capabilities include providing short-range forecasts for extreme weather events like thunderstorms, estimating visibility for aviation purposes, and studying phenomena such as forest fires, smoke, and snow cover, in addition to supporting climate studies.

### Launch Details

✓ GSLV-F14, a three-stage launch vehicle with a length of 51.7 meters and a liftoff mass of 420 tonnes, was utilized to launch the INSAT-3DS satellite into orbit.

### **Green Propulsion System Development**

Under the DRDO's Technology Development Fund (TDF) program, a Green Propulsion System was successfully developed and demonstrated its in-orbit capability on a payload launched by the PSLV C-58 mission.

### DRDO's Technology Development Fund (TDF) Program

TDF is a flagship program of the Ministry of Defence executed by DRDO under the 'Make in India' initiative. It aims to fund innovation in defense and aerospace sectors, particularly supporting startups and MSMEs.

### **About Green Propulsion System**

- ✓ A type of rocket engine that utilizes non-toxic and environmentally friendly propellants, offering a safer and more sustainable alternative to traditional propulsion systems.
- ✓ Green propellants are less hazardous to handle and produce fewer harmful emissions compared to conventional propellants like hydrazine.

### **Types of Green Propellants**

**1. Ionic Liquids:** These are salts that remain liquid at room temperature and can serve as both fuel and oxidizer in rocket engines.

### **PSLV C-58 Mission**

- ✓ The PSLV-C58 mission marked the 60th flight of ISRO's Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle.
- ✓ Launched on January 1, 2024, from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre in Sriharikota, India.
- ✓ The primary payload of the mission was the XPoSat satellite, designed to study X-ray emissions from celestial sources.
- 2. High-Test Peroxide (HTP): Concentrated hydrogen peroxide used as an oxidizer in rocket engines.
- 3. Methanol and Ethanol: Simple alcohols that can act as fuels in rocket engines.
- **4. Biopropellants:** Derived from biomass sources such as vegetable oils or algae, offering a renewable and sustainable option for rocket propulsion.



### **Open AI Sora**

OpenAI, the creator of the innovative ChatGPT chatbot, has introduced a new generative artificial

intelligence (GenAI) model named Sora. This model possesses the capability to transform text prompts into video content.

#### **About Sora**

- ✓ Sora represents an AI model designed to generate realistic and imaginative videos or scenes based on textual instructions.
- ✓ Trained on an extensive dataset comprising both text and video inputs, Sora can produce videos up to 60 seconds in length while ensuring high visual quality and adherence to the user's prompt.



### Sora Model Mechanism

- ✓ The model utilizes a transformer architecture, akin to the ChatGPT models, to achieve superior scaling performance.
- ✓ It represents videos and images as collections of smaller data units known as patches, similar to tokens in GPT models.
- ✓ Sora's development builds upon previous research, particularly leveraging techniques from OpenAI's DALL-E model.
  - DALL-E, introduced in January 2021, is a text-to-image model capable of generating digital images from natural language descriptions.
- ✓ Sora incorporates the recapturing technique from DALL-E 3, involving the generation of descriptive captions for visual training data.

### **Applications of Sora**

- **1.** Sora exhibits the ability to generate intricate scenes featuring multiple characters with specific movements and precise details of both the subject and background.
- **2.** The model not only comprehends the user's prompt but also understands how these elements translate into the real world.
- **3.** Leveraging its deep understanding of language, Sora accurately interprets prompts and creates characters with vibrant emotions, enhancing the richness and realism of the generated content.

### **GRAPES-3** Experiment

The Tata Institute of Fundamental Research's GRAPES-3 experiment, located in Ooty, India, has made significant strides in cosmic ray research, identifying a novel characteristic in the cosmic-ray proton spectrum.

### About GRAPES-3 (Gamma Ray Astronomy PeV EnergieS phase-3 experiment)

✓ GRAPES-3 is a Muon telescope facility designed to study cosmic rays and investigate phenomena such as solar modulations and geomagnetic effects on cosmic ray intensity.



### **CLAT CAM FEB. 2024**

✓ **Objective:** The experiment aims to explore cosmic rays in the PeV (Petaelectron Volt) energy range, corresponding to extremely high-energy particles, to understand their origin, acceleration, and propagation.

### **Understanding Cosmic Rays**

- ✓ Cosmic rays are high-energy charged particles, predominantly protons and atomic nuclei, originating from various sources in the universe.
- ✓ Contrary to their name, cosmic rays are not rays but fast-moving particles that constantly bombard Earth's atmosphere from outer space, generating particle showers comprising electrons, photons, muons, protons, and neutrons.

### Components of GRAPES-3

- **1. Scintillator Array:** Consisting of 400 plastic scintillator detectors covering an area of approximately 50,000 square meters. These detectors record charged particles produced when cosmic rays interact with the atmosphere.
- **2. Muon Detector:** A large-area (560 m²) tracking muon detector used to identify muons, secondary particles produced in cosmic ray interactions, and study their properties.

### **Key Findings**

- **1. Novel Feature in Cosmic-Ray Proton Spectrum:** GRAPES-3 has discovered a new feature in the cosmic-ray proton spectrum around 166 TeV energy. This finding suggests a deviation from a single power-law spectrum, providing valuable insights into acceleration mechanisms.
- **2. Acceleration of Muons during Thunderstorm Conditions:** In 2014, the experiment observed the acceleration of muons during thunderstorm conditions, indicating potential new avenues for studying cosmic ray acceleration in Earth's atmosphere.

The GRAPES-3 experiment continues to deepen our understanding of cosmic rays and their behavior, offering significant contributions to the field of astroparticle physics.

# High Altitude Pseudo Satellite (HAPS): Revolutionizing Aerial Technology

CSIR-National Aerospace Laboratories (NAL) has conducted successful tests of an unmanned aerial vehicle known as High Altitude Pseudo Satellite (HAPS).

#### **About HAPS**

- ✓ **Definition:** HAPS are aircraft positioned above 20 km altitude, in the stratosphere, for very-long-duration flights, sometimes lasting months or even years.
- ✓ Features:
  - Altitude: Capable of reaching heights up to 23 km.
  - **Duration:** Can remain airborne for at least 90 days.
  - **Design:** May include airplanes, airships, or balloons.
- ✓ Recent Test: A 5-meter-long system, with an 11-meter wingspan and weighing 23 kg, rose to about 3 km and stayed aloft for about eight hours during the recent test.

### **Benefits/Advantages of HAPS**

- ✓ **Bridge the Gap:** Serve as a link between lower altitude UAVs and conventional satellites in space.
- ✓ **Applications:** Telecommunications, emergency/public safety communications, intelligent transportation systems, maritime surveillance, environmental monitoring, land border control, etc.
- ✓ **Coverage and Interference:** Can cover larger areas with less interference compared to ground-based communication networks.
- ✓ **Data Transfer:** Facilitate data transfer between satellites and ground-based telecom networks.
- ✓ Cost and Launch: Significantly cheaper and easier to launch compared to traditional satellites.

### Significance for India

- ✓ **Border Security:** Crucial for safeguarding India's long and complex land border of about 15,000 km and coastline of about 7,500 km.
- ✓ **Applications:** Round-the-clock missions, border patrolling, target tracking, maritime surveillance, navigation, and missile detection.
- ✓ **Comparison with China:** China's AVIC has been developing similar HAPS platforms for surveillance, including the solar-powered Morning Star drone, capable of long-duration flights.

In light of recent concerns about online child safety, particularly regarding exposure to inappropriate content and risks posed by online predators, there is a growing recognition of the need for concerted efforts to protect children in the digital realm.

### **Challenges**

- **1. Exposure to Inappropriate Content:** Children may inadvertently encounter harmful content like violence, pornography, and hate speech while browsing online.
- **2. Online Predators and Grooming:** The proliferation of social media and gaming platforms has facilitated the grooming of children by online predators, who exploit these platforms to establish relationships for malicious purposes.
- **3. Cyberbullying:** Digital technology is used to harass, intimidate, or humiliate children, leading to serious psychological and emotional consequences.
- **4. Privacy Concerns:** Children may unknowingly share personal information online due to a lack of understanding about privacy settings.
- **5. Addictive Behavior:** Excessive screen time and device usage can lead to addictive behavior among children, affecting their mental, physical health, academic performance, and social interactions.

- ✓ **Data Collection and Privacy:** Tech companies collect vast amounts of data, raising concerns about privacy, security, and surveillance, particularly among children.

- ✓ **Impact on Mental Well-being:** There are concerns about the impact of interacting with AI-generated content on the mental well-being of young minds.

- **1. Tech Company Responsibility:** Incorporating safety features and mechanisms into platforms to protect children from harmful content and interactions.
- **2. UNICEF's Guidance for Child-Friendly AI:** Guidelines emphasizing children's development, data protection, and privacy in AI technologies.
- **3. Government Oversight:** Implementing regulatory frameworks and addressing harmful online content and behaviors through legislative measures.
- **4. Parental Involvement:** Educating parents about internet safety measures, utilizing parental controls, and monitoring children's online activities to mitigate risks.

✓ The Defence Acquisition Council (DAC) has given the green light to capital acquisition proposals totaling Rs 84,560 crore.





✓ These projects aim to bolster the capabilities of the Armed Forces and the Indian Coast Guard, covering various sectors.

### **Key Projects Cleared by DAC**

### 1. Maritime Reconnaissance and Multi-Mission Aircraft:

 Acquisition of 15 aircraft for the Navy and the Coast Guard to enhance maritime surveillance and security.

#### 2. Flight Refueller Aircraft:

• Procurement of six aircraft for the Indian Air Force (IAF) to strengthen aerial refuelling capabilities.

#### 3. New Generation Anti-Tank Mines:

 Deployment of advanced anti-tank mines for the Army to enhance ground-based defense capabilities.

### 4. Heavy Weight Torpedoes (HWT):

 Acquisition of torpedoes for the Navy's Scorpene-class submarines to bolster underwater warfare capabilities.

### Amendments to DAP 2020

- ✓ The DAC has approved modifications to the Defence Acquisition Procedure (DAP) 2020, focusing on various aspects such as benchmarking, cost computation, payment schedules, and procurement quantities.
- ✓ These changes are aimed at facilitating the procurement of advanced technologies from startups and Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs).
- ✓ Special emphasis has been placed on sourcing equipment from Indian vendors to promote indigenous manufacturing and reduce dependence on foreign suppliers.

✓ The first joint military exercise between the Indian Army and the Royal Saudi Land Force, called Sada Tanseeq, was held at Mahajan Field Firing Ranges in Rajasthan.

### MILAN 2024: Indian Navy's Largest Naval Exercise

- ✓ MILAN 2024, the 12th edition of the Indian Navy's largest naval exercise, took place in Visakhapatnam in February 2024.
- ✓ Participation: Over 50 countries participated.
- ✓ Theme: "Camaraderie Cohesion Collaboration".
- ✓ **Inauguration:** The Defence Minister inaugurated NISHAR, a platform created by the Indian Navy for networking and information-sharing.
- ✓ **NISHAR:** Allows ships of friendly navies to share information through the MITRA terminal, working on plug-and-play architecture.

### Vayu Shakti 2024: Demonstrating Air Force Capabilities

✓ The Indian Air Force (IAF) conducted Exercise Vayu Shakti-2024 in February 2024 at the Pokhran firing range in Rajasthan.



### **CLAT CAM FEB. 2024**

- ✓ Aim: Demonstrating the IAF's full spectrum of operations, including combat and fire capabilities, in a realistic scenario.
- ✓ **Frequency:** Triennial exercise, conducted once every three years. Previous edition held in February 2019.

### **Establishment of 18 Corps for LAC Operations**

- ✓ The Indian Army plans to establish a new corps, named **18 Corps**, to oversee operations along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the central sector.
- ✓ The proposed area of responsibility for the 18 Corps spans 545 kilometers across Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand.
- ✓ The **Headquarters Uttar Bharat (HQ UB)** area, currently based in Bareilly, will be transformed into the operational headquarters of the 18 Corps.
- ✓ This transformation will involve shifting the focus of HQ UB from its current role of managing peacetime duties to fully engaging in operational activities along the LAC in Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand.
- ✓ The HQ UB area presently oversees peacetime locations and training establishments in Uttarakhand and western Uttar Pradesh, in addition to its responsibilities along the LAC in Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand.
- ✓ The region covered by the proposed 18 Corps is often referred to as the central theatre.

### Introduction of Kendriya Grihmantri Dakshata Padak

- ✓ The Union Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) has introduced a new medal, Kendriya Grihmantri Dakshata Padak, after merging four existing medals.

  Kendriya Grihmantri Dakshata Padak (Gold)
- ✓ The four existing medals merged to form the Kendriya Grihmantri Dakshata Padak are:
  - Union Home Minister's Special Operation Medal,
  - Union Home Minister's Medal for Excellence in Investigation,
  - Asadharan Aasuchana Kushalata Padak, and
  - Union Home Minister's Awards for Meritorious Service in Forensic Science.
- ✓ The award will be presented in the form of a medal, styled and designated as the Kendriya Grihmantri Dakshata Padak.







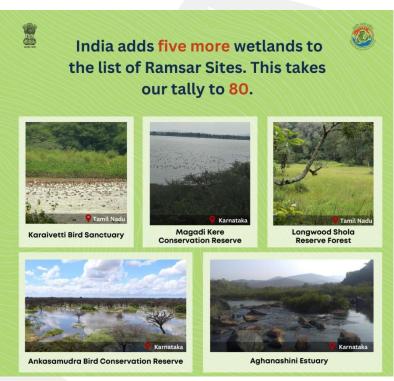
# ENVIRONMENT AND ECOLOGY

### Five More Wetlands to Ramsar List

- ✓ Five new wetlands (3 in Karnataka and 2 in Tamil Nadu) in India have been added to the Ramsar list reaching total count to 80.
- ✓ The Ramsar Convention recognizes wetlands of international importance.

### 1. Aghanashini Estuary (Karnataka):

- ✓ **Location:** Formed at the confluence of Aghanashini River with the Arabian Sea.
- ✓ **Importance:** Provides diverse ecosystem services including flood and erosion risk mitigation, biodiversity conservation, and livelihood support for local communities.
- ✓ Economic Contribution: Supports fishing, agriculture, collection of edible bivalves and crabs, shrimp aquaculture, and traditional fish farming.
- ✓ **Environmental Protection:** Mangroves bordering the estuary help protect shores against storms and cyclones.



### 2. Magadi Kere Conservation Reserve (Karnataka):

- ✓ **Significance:** Man-made reservoir serving as a haven for diverse wildlife and a popular birding destination.
- ✓ Biodiversity: Home to over 166 species of birds, including 130 migratory species.
- ✓ **Conservation Status:** Declared a conservation reserve in 2018.

### 3. Ankasamudra Bird Conservation Reserve (Karnataka):

- ✓ **Location:** Human-made Village Irrigation Tank in Northern Karnataka.
- ✓ **Biodiversity:** Supports over 200 species of birds, including pelicans, cormorants, storks, ducks, herons, and raptors.
- ✓ **Population Support:** Over 30,000 waterbirds nest and roost at this wetland, including significant populations of Painted Stork and Black-headed Ibis.

### 4. Karaivetti Bird Sanctuary (Tamil Nadu):

- ✓ **Location:** One of the largest inland wetlands in Tamil Nadu.
- ✓ **Economic Contribution:** Significant source of groundwater recharge, supporting agricultural crops and providing water for domestic use.
- ✓ **Biodiversity:** Home to over 200 species of birds, contributing to the Central Asian Flyway.



### 5. Longwood Shola Reserve Forest (Tamil Nadu):

- ✓ **Significance:** Important habitat for globally endangered and vulnerable bird species, including the Black-chinned Nilgiri Laughing thrush and Nilgiri Blue Robin.
- ✓ **Environmental Role:** Provides vital water source for surrounding villages, serves as a natural habitat for diverse wildlife, and contributes to maintaining the microclimate of the region.

### Ramsar Convention and Wetlands in India

Ramsar Convention: Established in 1971 in Ramsar, Iran, it is the only international treaty dedicated solely to the preservation of wetlands. India became a signatory to this convention in February 1982.

#### **Ramsar Sites in India:**

- ✓ Tamil Nadu has the highest number of Ramsar Sites (16 sites), followed by Uttar Pradesh (10 sites).
- ✓ The largest Ramsar Site in India is Sundarbans in West Bengal, while the smallest is Renuka Wetland in Himachal Pradesh.
- ✓ Chilika Lake in Odisha and Keoladeo National Park in Rajasthan were the first sites in India to be designated as Ramsar Sites.

#### **The Montreux Record:**

- ✓ It is a list of wetland sites within the Ramsar List facing ecological changes due to human interference, pollution, or technological developments.
- ✓ Two wetlands in India are on the Montreux Record:
  - 1. Keoladeo National Park (Rajasthan)
  - 2. Loktak Lake (Manipur)
- ✓ Chilika Lake in Odisha was previously on the Montreux Record but was removed in 2002. It was added to the record in 1993 due to concerns about siltation and sedimentation clogging the lake's mouth.

### **Atmospheric Rivers**

Atmospheric Rivers are long, narrow regions in the atmosphere that transport massive amounts of moisture, akin to rivers in the sky. They are characterized by concentrated water vapor moving across the atmosphere, often stretching thousands of miles in length and hundreds of miles wide, particularly over the Pacific Ocean.

### **Formation**

- ✓ **Moisture Evaporation:** They form over warm tropical oceans where the sun's heat evaporates large amounts of water vapor into the atmosphere.
- ✓ **Cloud Formation:** The moist air rises, cools, and forms clouds.
- ✓ **Coriolis Effect:** The Earth's rotation causes the Coriolis force, which deflects this air mass, creating long, narrow bands of concentrated moisture known as atmospheric rivers.

### **Examples:**

**1. Pineapple Express:** A strong and well-known atmospheric river that transports moisture from the tropical Pacific around Hawaii to the US and Canadian West Coasts.





- **2. Gulf of Mexico Influence:** The eastern half of the US also experiences atmospheric rivers, with moisture pulled from the Gulf of Mexico.
- **3. Global Impact:** Western Europe, North Africa, New Zealand, and Australia also experience frequent atmospheric rivers.

#### **Impacts**

#### **Positive Impacts:**

- **1.** Essential for cloud formation and influence air temperatures, sea ice, and other components of the climate.
- 2. Responsible for 90% of moisture movement from the tropics towards the poles.

#### **Adverse Impacts:**

- 1. Heavy Rain: Can cause intense rainfall leading to flooding and landslides.
- 2. Snowfall: In colder regions, they can bring heavy snowfall, disrupting transportation and infrastructure.
- **3. Strong Winds:** Accompanied by strong winds that can cause damage to trees, power lines, and buildings.

#### **Climate Change Impact:**

As the world warms, the atmosphere can hold more moisture, leading to potentially rainier atmospheric river events.

# Greening and Restoration of Wasteland with Agroforestry (GROW)

NITI Aayog has introduced the GROW initiative, aimed at revitalizing degraded land through agroforestry practices. The initiative seeks to restore barren land, promote agroforestry, improve rural livelihoods, and create a carbon sink to mitigate climate change impacts.

#### **Objectives**

- ✓ **Restore Degraded Land:** Targeting the revitalization of 26 million hectares of barren land by 2030 to contribute to India's Land Degradation Neutrality commitment.
- ✓ Promote Agroforestry & Improve Livelihoods: Encourage the integration of trees and shrubs alongside crops and livestock on farms, enhancing environmental and economic benefits for rural communities.
- ✓ **Create Carbon Sink:** Foster the development of a new carbon sink capable of sequestering 2.5 to 3 billion tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent, thereby mitigating the impacts of climate change.

#### **Key Features**

- **1. Agroforestry Suitability Index (ASI):** Developed a robust index using remote sensing and GIS technologies to map the suitability of different agroforestry practices across all Indian districts. This index aids in identifying areas suitable for various agroforestry activities.
- **2. Generating Live Maps:** Utilizes data to create area prioritization regimes, indicating highly suitable, moderate, and less suitable areas for agroforestry practices. These live maps provide stakeholders with valuable information for decision-making.





3. GROW-Suitability Mapping Portal: An accessible online platform showcasing state and district-level agroforestry suitability data. This portal empowers stakeholders with the necessary information to make informed decisions regarding agroforestry initiatives.

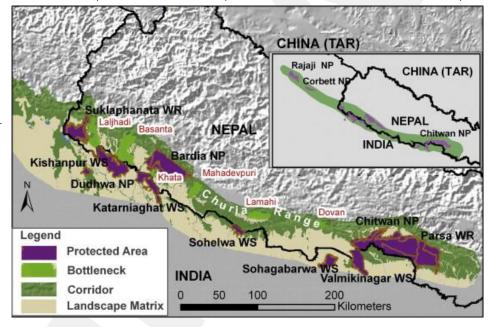
## Terai Arc Landscape (TAL)

Nepal's Terai Arc Landscape (TAL) initiative has gained global recognition from the United Nations as one of seven World Restoration Flagships. This initiative, launched in 2001, aims to conserve critical habitats,

connect fragmented landscapes, engage local communities and while promoting transboundary cooperation.

#### **Key Features**

1. Geographical Coverage: TAL spans 810 between the Yamuna River in the west and the Bhagmati River in the east. It encompasses the Shivalik hills, adjoining bhabhar areas, and the Terai flood plains. The landscape extends across the Indian states Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, and Bihar, as well as the low-lying hills of Nepal.



- 2. Protected Areas: TAL comprises 13 Protected Areas, including nine in India and four in Nepal. These protected areas play a crucial role in conserving biodiversity and maintaining ecological balance.
- 3. Objectives: The primary objectives of TAL include conserving critical habitats, connecting fragmented landscapes, and fostering community engagement. Transboundary cooperation between India and Nepal is also emphasized to ensure effective conservation efforts.
- 4. Flagship Species: TAL is home to several flagship species, including the Bengal tiger (Panthera tigris), the greater one-horned rhinoceros (Rhinoceros unicornis), and the Asian elephant. These iconic species highlight the biodiversity richness of the landscape and underscore the importance of conservation efforts.



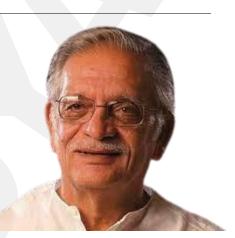

## 58th Jnanpith Award Recipients

Celebrated Urdu poet and lyricist Gulzar and Sanskrit scholar Jagadguru Rambhadracharya have been honored with the prestigious Jnanpith Award.

#### Gulzar

- ✓ Gulzar, also known as Sampooran Singh Kalra, is renowned as one of the finest Urdu poets of his generation and a distinguished director and writer in Hindi cinema.
- ✓ Born in 1934, Gulzar has been recognized with numerous accolades, including the Sahitya Akademi Award for Urdu, the Dadasaheb Phalke Award, the Padma Bhushan, and multiple National Film Awards.
- ✓ His song "Jai Ho" from the film Slumdog Millionaire earned him an Oscar in 2009 and a Grammy in 2010.
- ✓ In poetry, Gulzar introduced a new genre called 'Triveni,' characterized by non-mukaffa poems consisting of three lines.



#### Jagadguru Rambhadracharya

- ✓ Jagadguru Rambhadracharya is a Hindu spiritual leader, educator, and prolific writer with over 240 books and texts to his credit, including four epics.
- ✓ Born in 1950, Rambhadracharya is a polyglot fluent in 22 languages. He holds the position of one of the four present Jagadguru Ramanandacharyas of the Ramananda sect since 1982.
- ✓ He is a poet and writer in several Indian languages, including Sanskrit, Hindi, Awadhi, and Maithili, and was honored with the Padma Vibhushan in 2015.



### **Jnanpith Award**

- ✓ **Inception:** Instituted in 1961, the Jnanpith Award stands as India's highest literary honor, conferred annually by the Bharatiya Jnanpith.
- ✓ Recognition Criteria: The award acknowledges exceptional contributions to literature by Indian citizens since 1965. It's exclusively reserved for authors writing in Indian languages listed in the Eighth Schedule of the Constitution and English. Notably, posthumous awards are not granted.
- ✓ **Components:** Recipients are bestowed with a cash prize of □ 11 lakh, a statue of Vagdevi, and a citation, commemorating their literary achievements.
- ✓ **Inaugural Awardee:** The inaugural recipient of the award was Malayalam writer G. Sankara Kurup in 1965, recognized for his anthology of poems titled "Odakkuzhal" (The Bamboo Flute).

## Discovery of Deepasthambham in Mudimanikyam Village



- ✓ **Location:** Mudimanikyam village in Nalgonda, Telangana, is the site where a 390-year-old Deepasthambham (lamp post) has been unearthed.
- ✓ **Uniqueness:** While Dhwajasthambam (flag poles) are commonly found in temple architecture, lamp posts are rare in the Deccan region, contrasting with their prevalence in temples along the west coast, particularly in Goa.
- ✓ Historical Significance: The pillar, discovered near a ruined Siva temple, bears an inscription indicating its construction in 1635. The inscription, written in a blend of Telugu and Tamil, is dedicated to Kasi Viswanatha.
- ✓ **Geographical Context:** Mudimanikyam village, situated approximately 180 kilometers from Hyderabad, was under the rule of the Qutb Shahi rulers during the lamp post's construction. It is speculated that the lamp post served as a geographical marker for traders and ships navigating through the area, given the village's historical importance dating back to the early medieval period.



### Sammakka Saralamma Jathara

- ✓ **Significance:** The Sammakka Saralamma Jathara is one of the largest tribal festivals globally, held biennially in Medaram village, Telangana.
- ✓ Absence of Vedic Influence: This festival stands out for its lack of Vedic or Brahmanic influence and is celebrated purely in tribal traditions. It holds special cultural significance as the state festival of Telangana.
- ✓ **Commemoration:** The festival commemorates the legendary fight of a mother and daughter, Sammakka and Saralamma, against unjust rulers and laws.
- ✓ Religious Practices: During the festival, devotees offer bangaram (gold) in the form of jaggery, equivalent to their weight, to the goddesses Sammakka and Saralamma. They also partake in a holy bath in the Jampanna Vagu stream.
- ✓ **Jampanna Vagu:** This stream, a tributary to the River Godavari, holds historical and mythological significance as it is associated with Jampanna, a tribal warrior and the son of the tribal goddess Sammakka.
- ✓ **Community Gathering:** The Sammakka Saralamma Jathara brings together people from various tribal communities to participate in rituals, prayers, and cultural festivities, fostering a sense of unity and community spirit.

## **Attukal Pongala Festival**

- ✓ **Location:** Attukal Pongala is an annual 10-day religious festival celebrated at the Attukal Bhagavathy Temple located in Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala.
- ✓ **Key Event:** The highlight of the festival occurs on the ninth day, during which there is a massive gathering of thousands of women at the temple premises.
- ✓ **Pongala Preparation:** The preparation for the Pongala ritual begins with a sacred ceremony known as 'Aduppuvettu'. This ritual involves the lighting of the Pongala hearth, also known as Pandarayaduppu.



✓ **Significance:** Often referred to as the "Sabarimala for women," Attukal Pongala holds immense cultural and religious significance. It is renowned as the largest annual gathering of women, a recognition certified by the Guinness World Records.

## Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur

- ✓ **Recipient:** Shashi Tharoor, a prominent Indian politician, was recently honored with France's highest civilian award, the Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur.
- ✓ **Recognition:** Tharoor was recognized by France for his significant efforts in strengthening the relationship between India and France, his dedication to global peace initiatives, and his longstanding friendship with France.
- ✓ **Establishment:** The Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur, translated as Knight of the Legion of Honour, was established by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802.
- ✓ Purpose: This prestigious award acknowledges extraordinary achievements and services rendered to France across various fields, including arts, literature, science, and public service.
- ✓ **Durga Charan Rakshit:** Notably, Durga Charan Rakshit became the first Indian to receive this honor in 1896, recognized for his humanitarian contributions and service to society.

## India wins gold at 2024 Badminton Asia Team Championships

On February 18, 2024, India made history by winning its first-ever gold medal at the Badminton Asia Team

Championships held in Shah Alam, Malaysia. The Indian women's team secured the title by defeating Thailand 3-2 in an exhilarating final match.

#### **PV Sindhu's Stellar Performance:**

✓ World No. 11 PV Sindhu gave India a flying start by defeating Supanida Katethong, ranked 17th, with a score of 21-12, 21-12 in just 39 minutes.

#### Thai Fightback and India's Response:

✓ Despite Thailand's strong comeback, winning the next two rubbers, India's hopes were kept alive by Anmol Kharb, who clinched victory against Pornpicha Choeikeewong, securing the gold medal for India with a score of 21-14, 21-9.

#### **Significance of the Victory:**

- ✓ India's triumph marked its first-ever title at the Badminton Asia Team Championships, earning valuable ranking points for the Paris 2024 Olympics race.
- ✓ As semi-finalists, India also qualified for the 2024 Thomas & Uber Cup Finals.
- ✓ The victory provides invaluable experience and confidence to India's young players for future competitions.





## 6th edition of the Khelo India Youth Games (KIYG)

The 6th edition of the Khelo India Youth Games (KIYG) is currently ongoing from January 19 to January 31, 2024, across four cities in Tamil Nadu: Chennai, Trichy, Madurai, and Coimbatore.

#### 6th edition of KIYG

- ✓ Involves 933 medals (278 gold, 278 silver, and 377 bronze) across 26 sports in Tamil Nadu.
- ✓ Squash makes its debut, and Silambam, an indigenous martial art, is featured as a demonstration sport.
- ✓ The mascot is **Veera Mangai**, inspired by Indian queen Rani Velu Nachiyar who fought against British colonial rule.



#### **Khelo India Youth Games**

- ✓ KIYG is a national-level, multi-disciplinary sports competition for school and college students in India.
- ✓ Held annually in January or February as part of the government's Khelo India initiative.
- ✓ Aims to promote sports culture and identify talent at the grassroots level.
- ✓ Previous editions have been held in Delhi, Pune, Guwahati, Panchkula, and Bhopal.

#### **Format:**

- ✓ Divided into under-17-year-old school students and under-21 college students categories.
- ✓ Operates in a team championship format where individual medals contribute to the overall state or Union Territory (UT) tally.
- ✓ The state or UT with the most gold medals is declared the winner.
- ✓ Maharashtra and Haryana are the only states to have won the title so far.

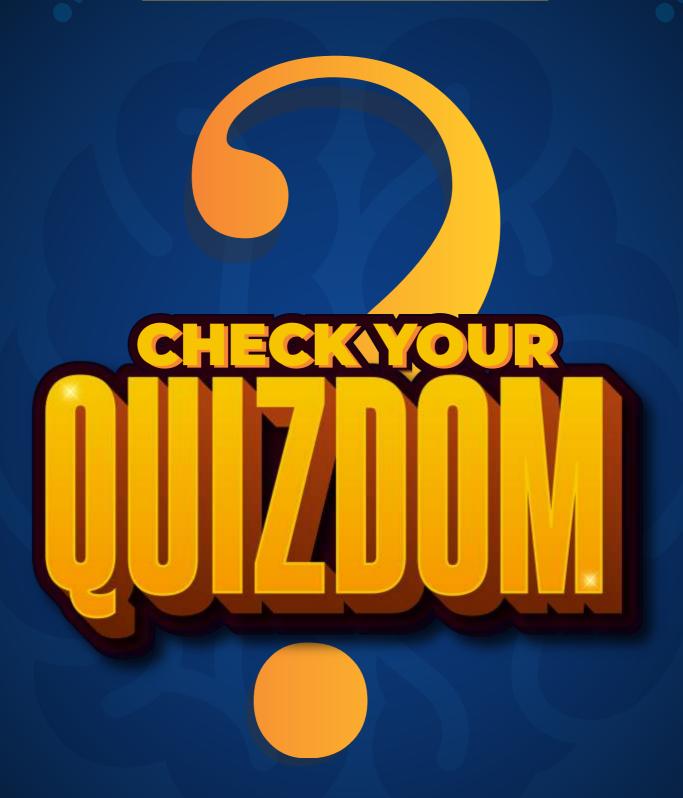

#### Passage 6

The recent amendments to the Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974 have drawn sharp criticism from environmental experts, who argue that the changes fail to address the fundamental shortcomings of the legislation. Despite calls for a comprehensive revamp to strengthen the Act, the amendments introduced by the central government have been perceived as exacerbating its weaknesses. The swift passage of the Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Amendment Bill, 2024 through both houses of Parliament within a mere 72 hours has raised concerns about the thoroughness of the legislative process. Experts lament that instead of bolstering the Act, the amendments have significantly weakened its efficacy, undermining its original purpose established five decades ago. Renowned water expert Himanshu Thakkar has voiced dismay over the amendments, asserting that the alterations run counter to the imperative need for decentralization and more stringent regulations. Thakkar highlights the divergence between the actual requirements, calling for stricter laws, and the amendments' tendency towards centralization and diluted provisions. Similarly, environmental lawyer Ritwick Dutta underscores the historical ineffectiveness of environment laws in India, including the Water Act. Dutta points to the alarmingly low number of criminal cases recorded under the Act, as reported by the National Crime Records Bureau in 2022, highlighting a glaring deficiency in enforcement and the imperative for stronger penal measures. In essence, the latest bill has been criticized for further weakening an already ineffective Water Act, exacerbating existing challenges rather than addressing them comprehensively.

## **ANSWERS & EXPLANATIONS**

#### 1. Ans. a

Exp. The legislature of Uttarakhand recently passed the Uniform Civil Code (UCC) Bill following the submission of the final report by a state-appointed panel. This makes Uttarakhand the first state in India to implement such legislation since Independence.

#### 2. Ans. d

Exp. Pushkar Singh Dhami is an Indian politician and a member of the Bharatiya Janata Party, serving as the 10th and the current Chief Minister of Uttarakhand since 2021.

#### 3. Ans. c

Exp. The UCC bill aims to govern and regulate laws related to marriage and divorce, succession, live-in relationships, etc., within the state. It has been prepared by a five-member committee led by former Supreme Court Judge Ranjana Prakash Desai.

#### 4. Ans. c

Exp. Bigamy/Polygamy is prohibited under the bill as per section 4 which states that neither party should have a spouse living at the time of the marriage. Thus, prohibition on bigamy/polygamy has been extended to all communities/Religions.

#### 5. Ans. c

Exp. UCC remains silent on the question of guardianship. Thus, the Guardians and Wards Act (GWA), 1890 will continue to govern court-appointed guardians while natural guardianship will be governed by personal laws. The Hindu Adoption and Maintenance Act (HAMA), 1956 and the Juvenile Justice (JJ) Act, 2015 will continue to prevail. Hindus, Buddhists, Jains, and Sikhs can adopt under HAMA. Mandating the registration of live-in relationships infringes upon the right to privacy, as recognized under Article 21 of the Constitution. The bill's introduction of a state-specific UCC opposes the framers' intent of having a common UCC for the entire country, as outlined in Article 44 of the Constitution.

#### 6. Ans. b

Exp. Anticipatory Bail or Pre-arrest Bail is a legal provision that allows an accused person to apply for bail before being arrested. In India, pre-arrest bail is granted under section 438 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973. It is issued only by the Sessions Court and High Court.

#### 7. Ans. a

Exp. NDPS Act or the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substance Act is Legislation passed on 14th November 1985. It regulates the Storage, Consumption, Transport, Cultivation, Possession, Sale, Purchase, and Manufacturing of Narcotics and Psychotropic substances. The act defines these substances and imposes severe penalties for violation.

#### 8. Ans. c

Exp. Small Quantity: If a person is found in possession, engaged in sale, or involved in manufacturing of a small quantity (less than 1 kg) of drugs such as cannabis, the punishment may include imprisonment for up to one year along with a fine of up to Rs 10,000.

#### 9. Ans. b

Exp. The National Policy on Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances is in accordance with Article 47 of the Indian Constitution. This policy mandates the state to endeavour to prohibit the consumption of





intoxicating drugs, except for medicinal purposes. This is due to the adverse effects these substances have on health.

#### 10. Ans. b

Exp. Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF): Directed by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) to be created by state governments under their respective Directors General of Police (DGPs) to fight the drug menace for a "drug-free India" by 2047.

#### 11. Ans. a

Exp. The Supreme Court of India ruled that Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) candidate Kuldeep Kumar is the validly elected candidate for the post of Mayor of Chandigarh Municipal Corporation.

#### 12. Ans. d

Exp. Returning Officer is an individual responsible for overseeing elections within a constituency, or sometimes two, and announcing the elected candidate. Appointment- Appointed by the Election Commission of India (ECI) in consultation with the relevant State Government or Union Territory (UT).

#### 13. Ans. d

Exp. The duties of the Returning Officer (RO) include preparing EVMs and VVPAT systems, notifying candidates about vote counting details, printing and dispatching postal ballots, publishing election notices, and scrutinizing nomination forms.

#### 14. Ans. a

Exp. History of Mayor's elections in India Municipal corporation mechanisms in India was introduced during British Rule with formation of municipal corporation in Madras (Chennai) in 1688, later followed by municipal corporations in Bombay (Mumbai) and Calcutta (Kolkata) by 1762. However, the process of introduction for an elected President in the municipalities was made in Lord Mayo's Resolution of 1870.

#### 15. Ans. c

Exp. In the case of Supreme Court Bar Association vs Union of India (1998), the Supreme Court highlighted that the powers granted under Article 142 of the Constitution are meant to complement existing laws, not to override them. These powers are intended to address certain issues that may not be fully covered by existing laws. However, the Court cautioned that these powers should not be used to ignore the rights of people involved in legal cases or to bypass the rules set by statutory laws. Instead, they should be applied in a way that helps to correct certain legal shortcomings or to achieve fairness and justice in specific situations.

#### 16. Ans. a

Exp. The inaugural meeting of the Inland Waterways Development Council (IWDC) was held in Kolkata by the Inland Waterways Authority of India, which is part of the Ministry of Ports, Shipping, and Waterways (MoPSW).

#### 17. Ans. d

Exp. Sarbananda Sonowal is an Indian politician of Bharatiya Janata Party from Assam who is serving as the current Cabinet Minister of Ports, Shipping and Waterways and Cabinet Minister of AYUSH, Government of India and the member of the Rajya Sabha representing Assam since 2021. The inaugural meeting of the Inland Waterways Development Council (IWDC) was coordinated by Union Minister Sarbananda Sonowal.

#### 18. Ans. b

Exp. The Inland Waterways Authority of India (IWAI) is a statutory body under Ministry of Shipping established in 1986 for development and regulation of inland waterways for shipping and navigation. It is





headquartered in Noida, Uttar Pradesh and its main function is to build necessary infrastructure in inland waterways, surveying economic feasibility of new projects and also carrying out administration and regulation.

#### 19. Ans. b

Exp. Under the National Waterways Act, 2016, 111 inland waterways (including five national waterways in India declared earlier) have been declared as 'national waterways. Out of the 111, National Waterways declared under the National Waterways Act, 2016, 13 are operational for shipping and navigation and cargo/passenger vessels are moving on them.

#### 20. Ans. b

Exp. The National Waterway-69 (NW-69) is the smallest waterway in India. The NW-69 has only 5 km in length. It is the part of the Manimutharu River which is located in Tamil Nadu state.

#### 21. Ans. b

Exp. An injunction is a remedy granted by the court that prohibits the commission of a wrong threatened or the continuance of a wrongful course of action already begun. If a party fails to comply with an injunction granted by a court, then the party could face criminal or civil penalties or contempt of court.

#### 22. Ans. c

Exp. In India, the legal framework concerning injunctions is established by the Specific Relief Act of 1963. Under this legislation, injunctions are categorized into two main types: permanent (or perpetual) injunction and temporary injunction. Section 36 of the Specific Relief Act states that Preventive relief is granted at the discretion of the court by way of injunctions, temporary or perpetual.

#### 23. Ans. d

Exp. Recovery of Possession of Property: The Specific Relief Act 1963 facilitates a remedy for those wrongfully dispossessed of immovable property, like land or buildings, enabling them to regain possession through a court order. Specific Performance of Contracts: In cases of contractual breaches, the Act empowers aggrieved parties to seek specific performance, compelling the breaching party to fulfill their contractual duties and ensuring adherence to the agreement terms. Rectification of Instruments: The Act permits the rectification of instruments, correcting errors in legal documents such as contracts or deeds, providing a remedy for mistakes.

#### 24. Ans. a

Exp. Dynamic Injunction: In some cases, courts grant injunctions even before a copyrighted work is publicly released, distributed, or created. This concept, known as dynamic injunction, is aimed at preventing irreparable loss due to online piracy.

#### 25. Ans. c

Exp. In a recent ruling, the Supreme Court emphasized that an injunction suit may not be maintainable if the plaintiff fails to prove title to the property while seeking injunction relief against the defendants. This underscores the importance of establishing legal standing and merit before seeking injunctive relief from the court.

Exp. The Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974, enacted under Article 252 of the Constitution, aims to prevent and control water pollution. 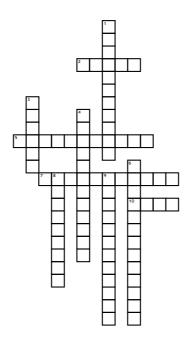

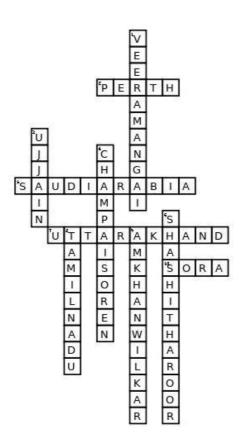
