Section - A: English

1. Answer: C

Reference Lines: "people with lower incomes...regularly exposed to high temperatures."

Explanation:

The focus is more on the living conditions and environmental exposure that directly impact health. Preventive education, while important, is not explicitly mentioned as a mitigating factor against heat-related issues in the passage. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.
- c) Immediate medical interventions are critical in managing heat-related emergencies. However, the passage emphasizes long-term environmental conditions over the lack of immediate healthcare responses as a primary exacerbating factor for health risks. This lack is more a background concern rather than the focus of the passage. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) The passage directly mentions that lower-income people are often in environments that do not protect well against heat, like poorly ventilated homes and exposure to heat in their jobs. This chronic environmental exposure aligns closely with the statement in this option, making it the primary factor mentioned in exacerbating health risks during heatwaves. Hence, option (c) is the correct answer.
- d) While occupational health safeguards are indeed important, the passage does not discuss them in depth or link them as a primary factor exacerbating health risks during heatwaves. The focus is more on the residential conditions rather than occupational environments. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

2. Answer: B

Reference Lines: "Even when air conditioning is available, people with lower incomes are less likely to be able to afford to use them."

Explanation:

- a) Social isolation and limited community support can exacerbate many issues, but the passage does not specifically connect these factors with the ability to cope with heatwaves. The primary focus is on physical and economic barriers rather than social support networks. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) The passage explicitly highlights economic barriers, particularly the cost of air conditioning, as a major obstacle for those in lower-income brackets when trying to mitigate the effects of heat. This aligns with the broader discussion on how poverty impacts the ability to cope with environmental challenges. Hence, option (b) is the correct answer.
- c) Cultural attitudes towards climate change might influence perceptions and adaptive behaviors, but the passage focuses on direct, tangible barriers such as the lack of affordable cooling technologies rather than cultural factors. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Geographic and urban planning factors are indeed important, but the passage specifically frames the issue within economic barriers rather than geographic variability. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

3. Answer: D

Reference Lines: "Save the Children warned that one in three children in Spain were unable to keep cool at home."

- a) A clinical tone would be detached, focusing purely on data and statistics without emotional engagement. The passage, however, conveys a clear concern for the well-being of children, emphasizing the serious consequences of heat exposure. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) Alarmist tone implies an exaggerated sense of danger, which is not the case here. The tone is measured and based on a credible source, indicating a reasoned concern rather than alarmism. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.



- c) Detached would imply a lack of emotional engagement or personal concern, which contradicts the clear empathetic concern expressed in the passage about the impacts on children. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) The passage expresses a concerned tone, highlighting the risks and advocating for awareness of the conditions children face during heatwaves, based on a report by a reputable child advocacy organization. Hence, option (d) is the correct answer.

4. **Answer:** A

Reference Lines: No direct reference to effective governmental interventions; focus on personal hardships and economic barriers.

Explanation:

- a) The passage does not mention any substantial governmental actions being taken to address the issues described, focusing instead on the challenges faced by individuals without suggesting that these have been effectively mitigated by government intervention. Hence, option (a) is the correct answer.

- c) True according to the passage, which explicitly mentions that those working in fields like agriculture and construction are more exposed to heat, making this statement accurate. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) True, as the passage notes the economic challenges in affording cooling technologies like air conditioning for those with lower incomes. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

6. **Answer:** B

- b) The narrator explicitly mentions feeling regret almost immediately after beginning the backwards walk up the hill, indicating a sharp shift from initial enthusiasm to discomfort and second thoughts. Hence, option (b) is the correct answer.
- c) Indifference would imply a lack of strong feelings about the activity, which contradicts the narrator's vivid description of physical discomfort and regret. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.



d) Satisfaction is generally associated with positive outcomes and feelings of accomplishment, which do not align with the narrator's experience of regret and physical struggle during the activity. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

7. **Answer:** D

Reference Lines: "with much huffing and whinging we walk backwards up a 30-metre-long section." **Explanation:**

- a) The passage provides no evidence that the activity was unexpectedly easy; on the contrary, it explicitly states how physically challenging it was. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) While they faced difficulties, the passage does not indicate that they wished to give up immediately but rather that they persevered despite the challenge. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Laughing at their foolishness is not mentioned. The focus is on their struggle and frustration, which is clearly articulated through descriptions of huffing and whinging. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) The description of huffing and whinging indicates a shared reaction of frustration to the physical demands and difficulty of the activity, matching the text. Hence, option (d) is the correct answer.

8. Answer: A

Reference Lines: Entire passage provides a narrative flow from an enjoyable scenic walk to a challenging activity, followed by a reflection on its popularity.

Explanation:

- a) This sequence logically captures the flow of the narrative. They initially enjoyed the scenic route, decided to increase the difficulty, faced the physical demands of walking backwards, and finally reflected on the activity's popularity. This matches the narrative structure and order of events in the passage. Hence, option (a) is the correct answer.
- b) Placing the reflection before fully experiencing the challenge disrupts the logical progression and does not align with how the events are presented in the passage. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Starting with the decision before the enjoyment of the scenic route does not reflect the actual sequence described in the passage. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) This sequence incorrectly positions the reflection and disrupts the chronological and thematic flow of the narrative. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

9. Answer: B

Reference Lines: "That can help you to build what we call proprioception, which is essentially how your muscles and your joints communicate with your brain, and how your brain communicates back to them to make sure you don't fall over."

- a) Emotional perception is not related to proprioception, which is specifically described as a physical communication process within the body for maintaining balance and spatial orientation. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) The text defines proprioception as the communication between muscles, joints, and the brain, which is crucial for coordination and balance. This definition directly aligns with the function of proprioception in maintaining stability and preventing falls. Hence, option (b) is the correct answer.
- c) Psychological resistance to change in physical activity is not discussed in the context of proprioception, which deals with physical rather than psychological aspects. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Proprioception does not involve metabolic adjustments, which are more related to biochemical processes within the body rather than sensory feedback mechanisms. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.



10. **Answer:** B

Reference Lines: "Backwards walking is so hot right now, literally and figuratively."

Explanation:

- a) The term "hot" metaphorically refers to trends and popularity, not an actual increase in temperature, making this interpretation incorrect. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) "Hot right now" is commonly used to describe current trends or fads, implying a significant increase in popularity or fashionability, which is supported by the passage's context of recent adoption and discussion in the Western world. Hence, option (b) is the correct answer.
- c) The difficulty or physical demand of the activity is not what is meant by "hot right now," which specifically refers to popularity. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) While the health benefits of backwards walking are debated, the term "hot right now" specifically refers to its status as a trend or fad, not the nature of its health debates. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

11. Answer: A

Reference Lines: "it has suddenly become very popular with parts of the western world."

Explanation:

- a) The passage specifically notes that the practice gained significant attention and adoption in the western world after being popularized by influencers. This is a direct result of the influence and reach that such personalities have on trends and practices within these societies. Hence, option (a) is the correct answer.
- b) While the therapeutic potential of backwards walking is mentioned, there is no specific linkage in the passage between its discovery by influencers and its recognition in medical practices. This option introduces a context that is not supported by the text. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) The integration into professional sports training is not discussed within the passage. This option assumes a usage area that the text does not confirm, making it speculative rather than factual based on the given information. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) The passage does not suggest that backwards walking is dismissed as a faddish trend; rather, it implies a genuine increase in its popularity, even if it is trendy. Therefore, this option misrepresents the tone and content of the passage. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

12. Answer: C

Reference Lines: "it's more about coordination."

- a) The passage explicitly states that backwards walking is not a muscle training or strength exercise, highlighting that its primary benefits are related to coordination and proprioception rather than muscular development. This clarification directly contradicts the premise of this option. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) Although any form of walking can potentially enhance cardiovascular health, the passage emphasizes the unique benefits of backwards walking in terms of coordination and proprioceptive feedback, not cardiovascular improvement. This makes the cardiovascular aspect secondary or incidental, not primary. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) The passage clearly outlines that the primary utility of backwards walking lies in enhancing proprioceptive communication and coordination, which are crucial for preventing falls and improving stability. This aligns directly with the described benefits in the text. Hence, option (c) is the correct answer.
- d) While weight loss could be a secondary benefit of any physical exercise due to increased calorie burn, the passage focuses on coordination and stability as the primary benefits of backwards walking. There is no emphasis on weight loss, making this option incorrect. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.



13. Answer: A

Reference Lines: The entire passage discusses a regional policing plan, geopolitical interests, and interactions between nations within a specific forum, which are typical contents of a geopolitical analysis journal.

Explanation:

- a) Correct. The content dealing with international relations, strategic interactions between nations, and detailed discussions on regional initiatives suggests it would fit well within a geopolitical analysis journal. It matches the typical themes of such publications, which analyze and comment on geopolitical dynamics and strategic interests among nations. Hence, Option (a) is the correct answer.
- b) Incorrect. There's no technological focus in the passage that would align with a technology-focused website, which would typically cover technological innovations, digital trends, or tech industry news. Hence, Option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Incorrect. The passage is not about travel or tourism; it discusses political and strategic issues, which are not typical content for a travel guide. Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Incorrect. The passage does not discuss sports or regional events related to sports, making it an unlikely content piece for a sports magazine. Hence, Option (d) is not the correct answer.

14. **Answer:** B

Reference Lines: The passage discusses the details of the Pacific Policing Initiative, including its goals, the role of Australia, funding, and the concerns of Pacific nations.

Explanation:

- a) Incorrect. There is no critique of Australia's foreign policy; the passage neutrally presents the details of the initiative. It does not take a critical stance but rather informs about the development and intentions behind the initiative. Hence, Option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) Correct. The passage provides a detailed explanation of the Pacific Policing Initiative, discussing its components, aims, and the involvement of different stakeholders. This outlines the initiative clearly for the reader. Hence, Option (b) is the correct answer.
- c) Incorrect. While China's influence is indirectly referenced, the passage does not advocate for China's inclusion but merely mentions concerns related to geostrategic interests. Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Incorrect. While funding and economic aspects are mentioned, the passage is not focused on detailing the economic impacts but rather on the initiative's structure and strategic importance. Hence, Option (d) is not the correct answer.

Answer: D

Reference Lines: Salwai's concerns about the initiative being framed to fit regional purposes and not developed to suit the geostrategic interests of big partners highlight the complex security dynamics.

- a) Incorrect. The passage does not directly suggest potential conflicts but focuses on the strategic planning and concerns around influence, which are part of managing complex security dynamics. Hence, Option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) Incorrect. Economic incentives are not the primary theme discussed in relation to geostrategic interests in this context. The focus is more on security and political strategy. Hence, Option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Incorrect. Military considerations are a part of geostrategic interests, but they are not the dominant theme discussed in the passage. The emphasis is broader, covering overall regional cooperation and security strategies. Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Correct. The complexity of how regional security is influenced by various national and international interests highlights the nuanced and often complicated nature of geopolitical relationships and strategies. Hence, Option (d) is the correct answer.



16. Answer: C

Reference Lines: This sentence sets up a causal relationship between the timing of Vanuatu's public expression of concerns and the announcement of the deal.

- d) Incorrect. This sentence describes part of the proposal but does not imply a cause and effect relationship between elements within the passage. Hence, Option (d) is not the correct answer.

17. **Answer:** D

Reference Lines: Albanese's statement that it is "a Pacific-led initiative" and reflects the desire of Pacific neighbours to "stand with each other and help each other in times of need." Explanation:

- a) Incorrect. The label does not necessarily imply a reduction of Australian influence but rather emphasizes regional leadership and initiative ownership. Hence, Option (a) is not the correct answer.
- b) Incorrect. While balancing influences might be a subtle aspect, the specific label "Pacific-led" aims more at highlighting regional autonomy and collaboration rather than directly addressing the balance of external powers like China. Hence, Option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Incorrect. The passage does not discuss shifts in international aid structure but focuses on the nature of the initiative's leadership and execution. Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Correct. Labeling the initiative as "Pacific-led" underscores the collaboration and mutual support among the Pacific nations, suggesting a collective approach to regional issues without direct control from outside powers. Hence, Option (d) is the correct answer.

18. **Answer:** B

Reference Lines: Concerns about the plan possibly being developed to suit the geostrategic interests of big partners suggest that strategic interests often influence how regional cooperation is framed.

- b) Correct. The concerns about the initiative being developed to potentially suit external strategic interests show that while regional cooperation is a goal, it often has to consider and sometimes accommodate these broader strategic interests. Hence, Option (b) is the correct answer.
- c) Incorrect. The passage clearly indicates that strategic interests are a significant consideration in the planning and execution of regional initiatives. Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Incorrect. Although external pressures influence regional initiatives, the passage points out efforts to maintain regional leadership and alignment with local needs, suggesting not all initiatives are solely determined by external pressures. Hence, Option (d) is not the correct answer.

19. Answer: A

- d) Incorrect. A "coordination hub" facilitates the organization and management of activities, which might involve some foresight but is not synonymous with the broader strategic foresight implied in geopolitical contexts. Hence, Option (d) is not the correct answer.

20. Answer: C

- c) Correct. If Australia were the sole funder, it might suggest a significant level of control or influence over the initiative, potentially undermining the claim that it is genuinely led by Pacific nations themselves. Hence, Option (c) is the correct answer.
- d) Incorrect. If the initiative was first proposed by the Pacific Islands Forum, it would strengthen the claim that it is Pacific-led, showing origination from within the region itself. Hence, Option (d) is not the correct answer.

21. Answer: A

Reference Lines: Salwai indicated the region should ensure the plan was "framed to fit our purposes and not developed to suit the geostrategic interests and geostrategic denial security postures of our big partners".

Explanation: a) Correct. Hence, Option (a) is the correct answer.

- b) Incorrect. While alignment with global strategies might be necessary, the emphasis in the phrase is on ensuring that these strategies are adapted to serve regional, not just local traditions but practical and strategic needs. Hence, Option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Incorrect. Independence from external influences is part of the broader context, but the specific focus here is on ensuring practical applicability and relevance to the region's own goals and circumstances. Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Incorrect. The phrase does not directly relate to governance structures; it focuses more on how strategies and plans are developed to meet regional needs effectively. Hence, Option (d) is not the correct answer.

22. Answer: B

Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.

- b) The passage does not present a single definitive conclusion but instead discusses multiple viewpoints and ongoing debates, making it less definitive. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) While the passage presents information, the ongoing debate about the nature of the migration suggests a tone that engages with uncertainties rather than remaining completely neutral. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) The passage does not critique or evaluate the events negatively; it merely explores different historical interpretations. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

24. Answer: A

Reference Lines: With the empire gone, many workers, from builders to vintners, no longer had a market for their products, leading to a shift toward subsistence farming.

Explanation: a) The passage explicitly links the end of Roman administrative structures with a significant economic and social shift toward subsistence farming as traditional markets and jobs disappeared. Hence, option (a) is the correct answer.

- b) While the invasion and the development of a new identity are discussed, the passage does not clearly establish this as a direct cause-and-effect relationship. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) The shift from urban to rural living is mentioned, but it's presented more as a part of broader social changes than as a direct cause-and-effect from the loss of urban centers alone. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) The Roman influence is described as having been replaced, not continued, which contradicts the proposed effect in this option. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

25. **Answer:** B

Reference Lines: The phrase "wafted by the wind" in the description of the ships suggests a sense of inevitability and natural force behind the invaders' arrival, symbolizing the sweeping changes they brought.

Explanation: a) While the journey could be unpredictable, the phrase is more poetically linked to the broader impact of their arrival rather than the specifics of their travel. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.

b) This option best captures the metaphorical use of the phrase, implying that the arrival of the invaders was as natural and unstoppable as the wind, leading to inevitable changes in Britain. Hence, option (b) is the correct answer.



- c) The natural progression of events is a plausible interpretation, but it doesn't specifically capture the historical impact implied in the passage. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) There is no direct connection in the phrase to the violence of the conquest; it more broadly suggests the force and inevitability of change. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

26. Answer: A

Reference Lines: The passage describes a transformation from Roman urban structures to a more Germanic rural lifestyle, suggesting a replacement of Roman systems.

Explanation: a) This option directly challenges the idea that Germanic systems replaced Roman ones entirely by suggesting continuity in the use of Roman infrastructure and economic systems, thus weakening the argument of a complete cultural overhaul. Hence, option (a) is the correct answer.

- b) While significant, DNA findings alone would not necessarily disprove the cultural and systemic changes described in the passage, which are more about social structures and daily life than genetic makeup. Hence, option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Peaceful coexistence suggests cultural integration but does not directly challenge the notion of systemic replacement, as both could potentially occur simultaneously. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) The pre-existing decline of Roman structures might explain their replacement but does not challenge the notion that Germanic systems took over. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

27. **Answer:** B

Reference Lines: The passage mentions that the new cultural identity and language in Britain drew on both continental and indigenous traditions, indicating a blend of influences.

Explanation: a) This option suggests a total replacement of Roman culture, which contradicts the evidence in the passage showing a mix of influences in the new cultural developments. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.

- b) This option accurately reflects the passage's description of the post-Roman British identity as influenced by both Germanic and Roman elements, making it the best fit with the author's implied view. Hence, option (b) is the correct answer.
- c) The passage does not support the idea of a completely homogeneous cultural landscape; rather, it points to a complex blend of old and new traditions. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) The dominance of Roman practices until the late medieval period is not supported by the passage, which describes a significant transformation by the 700s. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

28. Answer: A

Reference Lines: The author emphasizes the importance of understanding where the people of England came from to explain the dramatic transformations after the Roman era, suggesting that this knowledge is crucial.

I am going to release a statement about it as well. Only Laapataa Ladies has been sent for Oscars from India officially."

Laapataa Ladies is directed by Kiran Rao and stars newcomers Sparsh Srivastava, Pratibha Ranta, and Nitanshi Goel. The dramedy about two 'lost' brides in 90s rural India was a commercial failure but received acclaim critically. Swatantrya Veer Savarkar, on the other hand, stars Randeep Hooda as the activist and thinker VD Savarkar. Directed by Hooda himself, the film released to mixed reviews and did not set the cash registers ringing.

c) Incorrect: Individuals who strive for perfect balance are incapable of adapting to life's changing circumstances.

Explanation: This option presents an extreme view that isn't supported by the passage. While the text criticizes the idea of "perfect, static balance," it doesn't suggest that those who strive for it are incapable of adaptation. In fact, the passage acknowledges that pursuing balance, even if it remains an "elusive ideal," is part of a "lifelong journey" and involves "an evolving understanding of our own needs." This implies that adaptation and growth are part of the process, even for those seeking balance. The passage argues for a different approach, not that traditional balance-seekers are inherently inflexible.



d) Incorrect: The concept of balance can only be meaningful if it eliminates all forms of stress and conflict in one's life.

Explanation: This option presents an extreme and unrealistic view of balance that isn't supported by the passage. The text doesn't suggest that balance should eliminate all stress and conflict. Instead, it describes balance as a "continuous dance with life's rhythms" and talks about "finding harmony amidst the ever-changing tides." This implies that balance involves managing and navigating life's challenges, not eliminating them entirely. The passage advocates for a more dynamic understanding of balance, not an unrealistic state free from all stress and conflict.

In conclusion, option (a) is the most appropriate assumption for the argument presented in the passage. It underlies the critique of conventional balance models and supports the case for a more flexible, dynamic approach to managing life's demands, which is central to the concept of the pendulum lifestyle introduced in the text.

130. **Answer:** B

Explanation: a) The broad adoption of nudges reflects a nuanced understanding of behavioral science by developers.

The author might not fully agree with this statement, as there is an implication in the passage that the widespread use of the term "nudge" might be more of a trend rather than a reflection of deep comprehension of behavioral science. However, the passage does not explicitly state that the understanding is entirely lacking, leaving room for the possibility that some developers do grasp the concept well. Therefore, the author would likely not outright disagree with this statement, as it leaves room for varied interpretations. Hence, option (a) is not the correct answer.

b) Developers consistently apply the concept of nudges in line with its precise theoretical definition.

The author suggests that the term "nudge" is used broadly across various digital tools, potentially without a rigorous application of its true definition. This implies that developers might not always align with the strict criteria of what constitutes a nudge. The statement that developers consistently adhere to the precise definition contradicts the author's implication, making it the statement the author would most likely disagree with. Hence, option (b) is the correct answer.

c) The frequent use of "nudge" in app marketing may overlook the original concept's strict criteria.

The passage hints that the term "nudge" has become a popular selling point, which may lead to its misuse or misinterpretation in marketing. The author seems to imply that the broad use of the term could indeed overlook its original, stricter meaning. Since this aligns with the author's concerns about the overuse or potential misapplication of the concept, the author would likely agree with this statement. Hence, option (c) is not the correct answer.

d) The effectiveness of nudges is often gauged by their ability to subtly influence decisions without limiting choices.

This statement is in line with the author's explanation of what a nudge is supposed to do—alter behaviour predictably without removing options or significantly changing incentives. It reflects a core aspect of the definition provided in the passage. Since the author discusses nudges within this framework, they would likely agree with this statement, as it accurately captures the essence of what nudges are meant to achieve. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

131. **Answer:** B

Explanation: Option a: The Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act (2005) is described in the passage as providing civil remedies like "protection orders, judicial separation and monetary compensation." This indicates a clear belief that the current legal framework is inadequate and needs reform. The author also views the judicial review as an opportunity to make significant changes that could transform women's rights in India. Therefore, option (b) correctly captures the author's perspective that the current legal framework is insufficient and that criminalisation of marital rape is necessary.

Option c: While the author acknowledges that comprehensive data on marital rape is scarce, they also highlight that the available statistics are troubling. This suggests that the author believes marital rape is a significant issue, despite the challenges in data collection due to stigma, fear, shame, illiteracy, and legal barriers. Therefore, the author would disagree with the notion that marital rape is not significant due to the lack of data, making option (c) incorrect.

Option d: The passage discusses the challenges of addressing marital rape, including stigma, fear, shame, and legal barriers. However, rather than suggesting that these issues make marital rape a lesser priority, the author seems to argue that these barriers actually highlight the importance of judicial reform to address the issue. The mention of the upcoming judicial review as a significant opportunity indicates that the author sees this as a crucial moment to address marital rape in India, not a lesser priority. Thus, option (d) is also incorrect.

132. **Answer:** D

Explanation: a) Only I follows: The statement suggests that if airline companies in India start favouring male pilots, the proportion of women pilots will decline. While this scenario is plausible, the passage does not provide any specific evidence that male favoritism is currently happening or that it would directly result in a decline in women pilots. The passage emphasizes that India currently leads globally in the proportion of women pilots. If other countries were to implement similar or stronger policies promoting women in aviation, it is reasonable to infer that India's lead could be threatened. However, the passage does not discuss the actions of other countries or suggest that such a shift is imminent, making this statement a logical extrapolation rather than a direct inference. Hence, Option (b) is not the correct answer.
- c) Only III follows: The statement asserts that if India enforces strong gender equality policies, it will likely maintain its lead in women pilots. The passage highlights India's existing leadership position and suggests that this could be due to favorable conditions for women in the aviation industry. Therefore, it is reasonable to infer that continuing or strengthening gender equality policies would help India maintain or even enhance its leadership position. This inference is consistent with the information provided in the passage, making it a valid conclusion. Hence, Option (c) is not the correct answer.
- d) Both II and III follow: This option combines the inferences from statements II and III. The passage discusses India's current leadership in the proportion of women pilots, which implies that if other countries increase their efforts, India's lead could be challenged (II). Additionally, maintaining strong gender equality policies would logically help India retain its position (III). Both inferences are supported by a broader interpretation of the passage, making this the most accurate option. Hence, Option (d) is the correct answer.

Argument III complements this by highlighting the risk of AI being used in ways that might harm vulnerable populations if left unregulated. Together, these arguments provide a robust case for government oversight.

The statement only mentions the changes and concerns but doesn't suggest or imply that integration of traditional practices with technology is necessary or beneficial. This conclusion goes beyond the scope of the information provided and involves a subjective judgment about how to address the changes mentioned.

c) Both conclusions I and II follow. (Incorrect)

Explanation: This option is incorrect because while conclusion II logically follows from the statement, conclusion I does not. As explained earlier, conclusion II is directly supported by the sociologists' concerns mentioned in the statement. However, conclusion I suggests a specific course of action (integrating traditional practices with technology) that is not directly implied by the given information. Therefore, it's not accurate to say that both conclusions logically follow from the statement.

d) Neither conclusion I nor II follows. (Incorrect)

This conclusion is directly supported by the information given in the statement, as it logically addresses the concerns raised by sociologists about the impact of smartphones on rural community life and cultural practices. The other options either include conclusions that go beyond the scope of the given information or fail to recognize the logical connection between the statement and the need for research.

While the passage does not explicitly state that the interim government is reevaluating the Jamaat's role, this statement does not conflict with the passage and is therefore not necessarily false. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

This option correctly identifies that the fragmentation of data is presented as a significant obstacle to smooth credit appraisal. The passage explicitly states that data are spread across various entities, which hinders frictionless and timely lending. Therefore, it is reasonable to infer that this fragmentation is a major barrier to achieving the efficiency and speed that ULI seeks to facilitate. This inference aligns well with the passage's discussion of the challenges in the current system. Hence, option (c) is the correct answer.

d) Small and rural borrowers currently face significant delays in credit appraisal due to lack of streamlined data access.

This option implies that the lack of streamlined data access is currently causing significant delays for small and rural borrowers. While the passage does mention that ULI aims to reduce the time taken for credit appraisal for these borrowers, it does not provide detailed information on the extent of the current delays or explicitly state that the delays are significant. The focus is on potential improvements rather than a detailed analysis of existing issues. Therefore, while this could be a reasonable assumption, it cannot be strongly inferred from the passage as stated. Hence, option (d) is not the correct answer.

138. **Answer:** D

Explanation: Option a: This option suggests that the overall demand for electrical machinery and parts in India has decreased. While this could seem contradictory, it does not directly address the flaw in the commentators' reasoning. Option b: This option suggests that Vietnam reduced the price of its electrical machinery and parts, making them more competitive. The commentators could still be correct in their conclusion even if price competitiveness was a factor, so this option is not the best choice.

Option c: This option states that India has increased its imports of electrical machinery and parts from other countries besides Vietnam. While this could suggest a general trend, it does not directly challenge the commentators' specific reasoning that imports from Vietnam indicate a rise in demand for Vietnamese goods. This option fails to highlight the specific flaw in reasoning, making it less relevant.

Option d: This is the correct answer because it directly challenges the commentators' conclusion. If the increase in imports from Vietnam is due to Indian companies stockpiling goods in anticipation of future



shortages, rather than an actual rise in demand, the commentators' reasoning is flawed. They assumed that the increase in imports directly reflects a rise in demand, but this option suggests that the increase could be due to other strategic reasons unrelated to demand. This undermines the commentators' conclusion and highlights the flaw in their reasoning.

139. **Answer:** D

Explanation: Option a: This option suggests that the individuals improved their diet and exercise habits, which could explain why their blood sugar levels remained stable after stopping medication. It explains that the diabetes medication in question has a delayed withdrawal effect, meaning that blood sugar levels might remain stable for a short period after stopping the medication but will eventually spike. This explanation aligns with the passage's warning about the risks of discontinuing medication and clarifies why some people might temporarily experience stable blood sugar levels despite stopping their medication. Ultimately, this resolves the paradox by highlighting that the observed stability is temporary and does not negate the long-term risks of discontinuing medication.

c) Only 3 is implicit

The assumption that all companies focus on their reputation is too broad and is not supported by the statement. The statement could still be true



even if some companies do not prioritize reputation, as it only indicates that reputation is important to clients, not that it is universally prioritized by all companies. Thus, Option (c) is not the correct answer. d) Only 1 is implicit

Consequently, the contract, or at least the portion related to the extra payment, is void. The contract does not remain valid for the extra payment since the condition was not satisfied.

Option d: This option suggests that none of the above contracts remain valid. However, this is incorrect because Option b presents a scenario where the contract remains valid despite the non-occurrence of the event.
